### Executive Director's Report to the Board

Date of the Report: July 19, 2022

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#### **Enrollment**

As we approach the start of the school year, we always want to have a sense of where our enrollment falls. There is typically a decent amount of student movement during the first few weeks of the school year which is why the official student count does not occur until October 1<sup>st</sup>. However, as of August 25<sup>th</sup> we had 1045 students enrolled with offers out for an additional 4 vacancies. When the Board meets next month, we should have a much more stable view of our enrollment numbers.

# **Special Education Wages**

As the job markets continue to evolve, we are uncomfortable with the impact that is having on our ability to fill roles in our Special Education Department including teachers and paraprofessionals. This past spring, we introduced a pay differential between Special Education and General Education wages at Nova Classical. While I still believe this was a necessary approach, the differential we implemented was not large enough to yield the desired results. We are now moving forward with a plan to widen the differential in wages for Special Education staff. As a result of this change, most of our Special Education (new and existing) will be compensated at, or slightly higher, than similar roles at other schools in the area including in the St. Paul Public School district. Due to the Special Education funding formulas and reimbursements, this change is expected to have a net impact on our overall budget of under \$20,000. If it were not allocated towards this, this is money which would not legally be able used in any other part of Nova Classical's operations. We are hopeful that this change will allow us to fill the remaining openings in the Special Education department as well as retain our existing Special Education staff. This will have a positive impact on our students and overall school as our population of students who receive Special Education services continue to grow.

#### 2022 Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments (MCAs)

The Minnesota Department of Education publicly released the 2022 spring MCA assessment results on August 25<sup>th</sup>. While we will not be presenting a deep dive into the results (which occurs at the September meeting), I am pleased to share that after viewing the state results the following high-level trends were seen:

- Nova Classical was the #3 ranked district/charter in math proficiency.
- Nova Classical was the #3 ranked district/charter in reading proficiency.
- Nova Classical's students had higher math progress scores in 2022 than they did the year before the pandemic (2019).

However, for now it is great to know that our students are both leaders in the state in terms of proficiency and they are surpassing their pre-pandemic (2019) levels of progress.

#### **Start of Fall Sports**
