The TAs, Secretaries, Teachers, Counselor, and Administrators are continuing to keep "Attendance Matters" at the forefront of our daily and weekly routines. Secretaries and TAs have continued to make daily phone calls home for those students who are not in school by 8:45 a.m. Home visits are conducted on Friday morning for students with a high number of absences. Eleven home visits for attendance were conducted in October. Administrators have also made phone calls home for students who have less than seven total days of absence, thus far in the year. In October, 33 phone calls were made to remind parents/guardians of the District Attendance Policy. We currently have 10 STUDENTS in First Grade, 3 STUDENTS in Kindergarten, and 10 STUDENTS in Pre K who have PERFECT ATTENDANCE as of October 31st! WAY TO GO, KW/VINA students and parents!

The monthly attendance rate has improved for 1st graders at Vina Chattin Elementary from September to October, but we have seen a decline in Pre K and Kindergarten attendance rates. The following are our changes in attendance rates from September to October; Pre K-88.1% decreased to 85.1%, Kindergarten-84.4% decreased to 82.4%, and 1st Grade-83.9% increased to 85.1%. More focus and support will be given to Pre K and Kindergarten to ensure attendance rates improve during November.

This money along with the money from our sucker sales gives us enough to pay for the

train tickets. We will have another auction during P/T conferences to pay for the bus, movie and popcorn. We are quite relieved to meet the deadline for the train tickets. Each class celebrated Halloween with treats and activities. All of the Pre-K students participated in a Halloween parade at the Blackfeet Nursing Home. Each Pre-K student was given a new Halloween book to take home to encourage reading at home. These books were purchased with our grant money from last year.



As we finish up the quarter we look forward to visiting with parents next week to discuss the progress of






SAFETY MATTERS (School)

BEHAVIOR also matters at KW/Vina! We have seen a significant decrease in the number of referrals for our students from September to October. We had 23 behavior referrals at KW/Vina during the month of September and have decreased the number to 21 in October. The MBI team continues to closely monitor patterns of behavior by time of day, location of incident, and context. Seven of the 21 behavior referrals were written for behavior in the bathroom. To ensure the safety and improve student choices in the bathroom during restroom breaks, classroom teachers have retaught bathroom use expectations, actively monitored bathroom use, as well as ensure proper supervision during this time. Nine Solutions Meetings were held with parents/guardians and members of the school team in an effort to continue the development of a school/family partnership to improve student behavior. We are truly grateful to have a full staff of behavior support personnel on our campus.

This month at BNAS we worked on building sentence structure using are learned Blackfeet words. For example. The man is running would be, Niina Oksskaasii. Another would be Ponokamita oksskaasii- the horse is running etc. We are continuing with counting in blackfeet, our classroom commands, such as sit down makopit, stand up -nipopopiit, line up -maaksipoit, Our Animals in blackfeet, and our colors in blackfeet. The students have been learning the brown bear story in blackfeet. They have enjoyed the story very much. This Month we will be adding more words and using longer sentences in the blackfeet language, adding numbers 11 to 20 to our counting routine and learning some new thanksgiving words. the students love to learn new words and get very excited to use them when they go home. I have encouraged them to go home and practice with family. So far they have told me they have been going home and using the words they learned at school
