Goal One – Learning

Our 3rd graders took on an exciting STEM challenge inspired by The Great Turkey Race! Students designed and built creative transportation devices to help their turkeys cross the finish line. This activity encouraged problem-solving, teamwork, and engineering skills while sparking their imaginations. What a fun way to combine STEM with a Thanksgiving twist! Thank you to our classroom teachers and STEM coach, Mrs. Gemmell, who continue their collaboration in implementing new ways to create hands-on problem-based learning in the classroom.






Our 5th grader engineers showcased their creativity and problem-solving skills in a recent STEM activity where they designed and built mini floats. Using Ozobots, they coded parade routes to bring their floats to life! This hands-on project combined engineering, design, and coding, allowing students to explore collaboration and critical thinking while having fun. These Ozobots were the product of a Team 66 Grant, so thank you to Team 66 & Mrs. Csorba for making these happen!

On December 11th, our teachers learned about the next steps in becoming a CHAMPS school. With CHAMPS being the student-facing framework (Conversation Level, Help, Activity, Movement, Participation & Success!), STOIC is the teacher-facing framework that creates the environment for CHAMPS to be successful. Teachers collaborated with colleagues across the building to create implementation plans for this practice. STOIC means: Structure for Success, Teach Expectations, Observe, Interact Positively and Correct Fluently. Staff received this framework positively, as consistency between classrooms is clear for students and easier to implement consistent expectations. With so many new staff members at Prairieview, it's helpful to begin identifying shared values such as these. Goal Two - Whole Student Development

Our next "Habit of a Champion" is: **Communicator**! *An effective communicator conveys their message thoroughly and is receptive and responsive to others.* Throughout January, we're reflecting on how we communicate with each other - verbally and non-verbally. Our students have very different influences on their communication skills than many of us adults did, so we'll need to work together to be understood and ensure we are communicating with respect and kindness. As adults, this is important for us, too. Thanks to the generosity of another Team 66 grant, our paraprofessionals are doing a book study utilizing the book "What We Say & How We Say It Matter." For adults, this is important for us since we model the kind of communication we expect from our students & children.
