The Foundation of a WorldStrides Program

SUBJECTS	Students will use key questions of inquiry to learn concepts of history, dramatic arts, communication arts, visual arts, finance, and culture. The interrelatedness of these subjects is emphasized.
SKILLS	Students will develop tools needed to acquire, organize, and communicate artistic knowledge. These include thinking, research, and self-management. Emphasis is placed on practical production in the arts.
ATTITUDES	Students will be encouraged to make connections within the arts and learn to reflect on their experiences as they relate to the real world.
ACTIVITIES	Students will learn to take appropriate actions and become actively involved in their own education. Through this program, they will explore how they can make a difference in their school or community through their own creativity.

SUBJECTS: Learning About Art

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Communication Arts	Students will cultivate their creativity and writing ability with an emphasis on gathering news and writing about it in appropriate styles. Speaking, interviewing and broadcast journalism are comprehensive topics that will be taught.								
Culture	Students will compare cultures and study ethics in communication and creative ideas in the visual arts, musical arts, dramatic arts and communication.								
Dramatic Arts	Students will learn performance skills, interpretation strategies, and production techniques as they develop personal confidence, initiative and knowledge within dramatics.								
History & Economics	Students will experience life in New York City from historical viewpoints and economic perspectives. Students will learn how to navigate through the city and appreciate different facets of life as a NYC artist.								
Visual Arts	Students will develop practical skills, understanding of the elements of art and principles of design and gain confidence in a range of artistic activities, such as drawing, painting, and mixed media.								

SKILLS: Learning How to Create Art

Communication	Students will express their ideas and information with creativity, confidence and clear articulation.								
Drawing	Students will learn the elements of art and the principles of design that are blended with traditional art fundamentals. Research, art history, conceptual thought, and movement are highlighted.								
Writing	Students will develop the skills in writing different kinds of articles, understanding news and the process of publication, and becoming more critical readers and viewers of mass media.								
Acting	Students will practice script interpretation, study the art of the stage, and understand the essential nature of criticism. Students will perform and demonstrate skill in acting techniques and the basic processes of theatrical production.								
Critique	Students will acquire the skills necessary to conduct purposeful, constructive criticism for performance, design, and communication.								

ATTITUDES: Learning Beyond Art

Respect	Students will develop empathy and compassion for others as expressed through the arts.
Responsibility	Students will be equipped with the ability to apply artistic expression with appropriate knowledge.
Curiosity	Students will be stimulated to inquire, thus fostering the spirit of discovery and excitement in learning about the arts.
Cooperation	Students will be encouraged to understand diversity, flexibility, and sensitivity of other people and events within the art world.
Confidence	Students will build and reinforce a sense of identity and independence.
