BACKGROUND:

The following is a summary of events and items from our sites.

Austin High School:

Support and resources to ensure a safe and welcoming learning environment.

- On April 26th, 500 AHS students attended Prom, and it was a great night for students and staff.
- AHS is looking forward to our final competition events for the Battle of Connects this Wednesday, May 7th.
- AHS held its first ever Culture Week on April 25th May 2nd. Activities included a kickoff assembly on Friday with quest speakers from the community, dress-up days throughout the week, cultural booths, student dance performances, and an after-school volleyball game. The week is more than just a celebration—it's a reflection of who we are as a school, as a community, and as a city. We live in Austin, a place that thrives on creativity, openness, and diversity. We come from many different backgrounds, speak many languages, hold many beliefs, and carry with us stories from all over the world. That's not something to set aside—it's something to celebrate. - Packer Study Table for student-athletes is proving to be a success. Since our first Spring Season grade check, we have had 15 student athletes removed from the academic ineligibility list. We

 - Angie Taylor shared the ALC success during the National BARR conference. We continue to see students meet or exceed goal targets in both AOA and ALC with this foundational support.
- Excellence in resource management.
 - As we are wrapping up credit recovery we want to thank our night school teachers: Camille Osmonson, Elizabeth Rassumussen, Leslie Leffers, Jessica Stanley and Kim Goblerish. Without them we wouldn't have been able to

support the number of students recovering credit in such meaningful and personal ways.

Ellis Middle School:

- Safe and welcoming learning environment:
 - Our building leadership has identified 10 areas of focus for the remainder of the 24/25 school year and for the 25/26 school year. For each area we had two categories: "Concerns" and "Solutions". Each area was an independent poster hung in our conference room. Staff was given time to look at each are and offer ideas. The feedback will become part of our Site Improvement Plan for the 25/26 school year. The category areas are:
 - Staff Moral
 - Student Activities
 - Student Equity
 - Student Academic Success
 - Professional Development Days
 - State and District Testing
 - Hallways/Passing Time
 - Scheduling
 - Student Behavior
 - Supervision
 - As you may recall, one of our leadership team's goals for this year was to improve the student experience. We have conducted two student survey's so far and reviewed the data. Major area for focus: "having more time with friends" and "I like coming to school" for example. Student's trust in their teachers was high as well as "I know what teacher expect of me". We will continue to review this data to make adjustments.
 - We have started our improvement plan for next year with a larger emphasis on Professional Learning Communities.
- Packer Profile:
 - We will work with the Riverland Staff and the United Way staff to set up an Assurance Grant Account for each 8th grader.
 - We will also have visits from AHS staff to talk to our 8th graders about transitioning to AHS.
- MTSS for all students:
 - We had our last installment of our HITS training on April 21st. This session focused on reviewing what we have learning this year and giving teachers time to reflect.

 Members of the district wide grading team provided feedback from our staff on "Life Skills Grades". We are working as a team to make sure our reporting procedures meet families' needs.

- We received a \$20,000 grant from the Austin Public Education Foundation for classroom libraries. We will supplement that amount with building funds.
- Our largest purchase this summer will be book shelves for classrooms.

This impactful learning experience has equipped our teachers with high-leverage strategies to support language development and early literacy instruction. To honor their hard work, dedication, and commitment to student success, we celebrated with a sheet cake and a moment of recognition. The knowledge gained through OL&LA will have a lasting influence on our students' learning and growth. This professional learning also lays the foundation for our development plan next year, as we focus on deepening our understanding and fully implementing these practices in our classrooms.
 - On Tuesday, May 6th, Banfield will host a fun and engaging spring family night! The evening will include a bounce house, a book walk, pizza, a BOGO book fair in the library, a nature center activity station, and a temporary tattoo table. This event is a wonderful opportunity to connect with our Banfield families and welcome our incoming kindergarten students.

 - May is a busy month at Banfield, with each grade level participating in field trips that offer exciting learning opportunities. These experiences are thoughtfully planned by our teachers to align with future careers and the Packer Profile, helping students make real-world connections. It's also a great time for families to get involved, as some trips may need volunteers to help support these meaningful experiences.
 - Even with the flurry of field trips this season, our Special Education teachers, Multi-Language Learner teachers, and Reading Intervention teachers have been able to maintain consistent instructional routines with students, thanks to the structure of their daily schedules. Preserving this consistency will remain a top priority as our team begins reviewing and planning the 2025–2026 building schedule.

 - Last week, our 3rd and 4th grade students wrapped up their MCA assessments, and now the entire building is transitioning to STAR360 and FAST benchmark assessments. We're eagerly anticipating the results and look forward to seeing the growth our students have made throughout the year.

- As we look ahead to the 2025–2026 school year and re-engage in Professional Learning Community (PLC) work focused on strengthening Tier 1 instruction, our Site Leadership Team has been discussing key elements such as roles within PLCs, as well as proposed dates and meeting times. With the completion of our OL&LA training, this renewed focus on collaboration and instructional practices will be a central priority for our building next year.
- Excellence in resource management.
 - In the upcoming weeks, there are scheduled meetings with individual teachers and grade levels to discuss scheduling, room assignments and other considerations for the upcoming year. This also includes staff reviewing the class rosters that have been compiled over the past six weeks from Mr. Haugen.
 - As we wrap up our budget for the 24-25, we've been able to add some significant upgrades to the building with signage, furniture and rebranding of the building with visuals and materials for staff and students.

The conference reinforced the importance of building strong relationships and maintaining clear, consistent data-driven systems to help all students thrive. We're excited to carry this learning forward as we continue growing greatness at Sumner!
- Our third and fourth graders have successfully completed the MCA assessments—great job to all of them! Next, we'll begin our spring benchmark assessments. These assessments help us track student growth over the course of

the year and identify key success criteria for end-of-year outcomes. This information is essential in guiding our instruction and celebrating how far our students have come.

 - Preschool graduation will be happening May 27-29 at the CLC for our Prekindergarten students. We look forward to sharing this new tradition with our students and families. All board members are invited to attend one of our ceremonies!
 - During the 24-25 school year we had 16 Early Childhood Family Education classes as well as one field trip!
- District-wide multi-tiered systems of support for all learners.
 - Early Childhood LETRS training completed with curriculum writing happening in June to articulate implementation of our learning.

- This spring our early childhood students received 1094 stickers to honor behaviors that support our three program wide expectations: I am a friend, I am safe, and I am responsible.
- Job-alike PLC meetings as well as completion of IGDP's are happening this month in our early childhood professional learning communities.
- Austin Adult Learning has served 459 students during the 24-25 school year in either GED, English Language, or Riverland Community College classes.

 - We had 280 students enrolled in preschool for the 24-25 school year. We currently have 53 students on our waiting list for the 25-26 school year.
 - Our ABE program will be receiving new laptops for staff and students as we begin implementation of a new ABE English Language curriculum in the 25-26 school year. Many thanks to Amy Thuesen and the tech department for facilitating these purchases.
