- The School District develops and the School Board approves a plan to support and improve teaching and learning that is aligned to the World's Best Workforce.
- The WBWF plan addresses the five WBWF goals related to school readiness, literacy, achievement gap closure, graduation, and college and career readiness.



2018-2019 School Readiness Goal

Key Focus Area: Screening

During the 2017-2018 school year, our district has 37% of children screened between their third and fourth birthday. Our district will increase the percent of children screened between their third and fourth birthday to 40% during the 2018-2019 school year.

2018-2019 Reading by Third-Grade Goal

Key Focus Areas: Consistent teaching of small group phonemic awareness, phonics, and word work.

The percentage of all students in grade 3 at OHA who meet or exceed on the MCA-III in Reading will increase from 64.5% in 2018 to 67.5% in 2019.

2018-2019 Closing the Achievement Gap Goal

Key Focus Areas: Continue the work on Complex Instruction, Math Talks, and Rich Math Tasks K-12.

The proficiency gap between the students who receive Free/Reduced Price Lunch (FRPL) in grades 3-8 and 11th in Mahtomedi Public Schools on the MCA-III in Math will decrease from 26.7% in 2018 to 23.7% in 2019.

Closing the Achievement Gap Achievement and Integration

What is the Achievement and Integration Program?

- Funding established by MN Statute sections 124D.861, 124D.862, MN
 Rules 3535.0100-01880
- District plan reviewed every 3 years, new plan in 2020
- ISD 832 is eligible for funding because we are in a collaboration with a racially isolated district, ISD 622 North Saint Paul-Maplewood-Oakdale

Racially isolated:

When a district and one of its adjoining districts have a 20 percent or higher differential in the number of enrolled protected students (African/Black Americans, Asian/Pacific Americans, Chicano/Latino Americans, American Indian/Alaskan Natives, and multi-racial), the district with the higher percentage is considered racially isolated.



Closing the Achievement Gap Achievement and Integration

Goals

By June 2020 the district will:

- Reduce it's proficiency gap between white and nonwhite students on the MCA III reading scores from 12.8% to 10% or less. (17.3% in 2018)
- Reduce it's proficiency gap between those third grade students qualifying for free/reduced priced lunch, and those not qualifying, on the MCA III Reading scores from 50% in 2017 to 5% or less. (29.3% in 2018)
- Reduce the number of 9th grade students responding "disagree" or "strongly disagree" on the Minnesota Student Survey to the question "Most teachers are interested in me as a person" from 31.1% to 15% or less.



Closing the Achievement Gap Achievement and Integration

Interventions

- K-5: move to heterogeneous literacy instruction
- K-5: Balanced literacy instruction
- Play-based kindergarten instruction
- Increased emphasis on teacher use of Early Reading and aReading data to inform instruction
- K-5: attendance intervention
- HS: Implementation of Restorative Practices
- Pre K-12+: Cultural Responsiveness Professional Development


