- **27283** Meeting Called to Order: Tammy Hawkins, Board President, called the Board of Trustees Meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.
- **Yerification of Compliance with Open Meeting Law:** Tammy Hawkins, Board President, verified that the provisions of Section 551.001 of the Texas Government Code have been met in connection with public notice of this meeting.

## 27287 Special Presentations:

The reorder of presentations was adjusted to recognize Shijay Sivakumar first.

**Recognition of Shijay Sivakumar State Qualifier in UIL Spelling & Vocabulary**: Mike Adkins, Chief Communications Officer introduced Shijay Sivakumar State Qualifier in UIL Spelling and Vocabulary. Shijay, a senior at

Odessa High School recently placed 3rd in the 6A division of the UIL Spelling & Vocabulary competition, a challenging written exam involving 1,500 words, including 300 vocabulary terms. The fast-paced test consists of three parts, with the first two timed. This is not Shijay's first recognition - he previously appeared at a school board meeting after qualifying for the Scripps National Spelling Bee in middle school.

Introduction of State VASE Honorees: Mike Adkins, Chief Communications Officer introduced the State VASE Honorees. VASE (Visual Arts Scholastic Event) is a statewide annual competition where high school students present their artwork and discuss their creative process with judges. Last school year, 18 of our students qualified for State VASE, and 11 earned the highest rating of 4 for their work.

#### Announcement of ECISD Named Best Communities for Music Education:

Ector County ISD once again was recognized for being named Best Communities for Music Education by the National Association of Music Merchants Foundation. This is the 11<sup>th</sup> consecutive year ECISD has achieved this prestigious, national recognition for its music program. Best Communities for Music Education is a signature program of The NAMM Foundation, and it recognizes and celebrates schools and districts for their support and commitment to music education and efforts to assure access to music for all students as part of a well-rounded education. In our district, more than 12,000 students are enrolled in fine arts courses, approximately 76% of our secondary students. ECISD has a commitment to, and a history of, excellence in the fine arts. Dr. Aaron Hawley, Executive Director of Fine Arts, was present to accept the award.

Announcement of ECISD Named District of Distinction by Texas Art Educators Association: ECISD has earned the District of Distinction award from the Texas Art Educators Association (TAEA) for the 5<sup>th</sup> consecutive year. The District of Distinction award celebrates our commitment to a well-rounded education that integrates a strong visual arts curriculum to inspire creativity and connect students to our community and beyond. In ECISD, about 5,000 students participate in visual arts. We are proud to be among the 109 school districts that received this honor – that represents only the top 8% of districts in the state!

- <u>Opening Remarks by Superintendent</u>: In opening remarks, Superintendent Dr. Keeley Boyer shared first-week statistics with the Board: current enrollment stands at 31,969, a decrease from the same time last year; approximately 28,749 meals are being served daily; about 600 more students are riding district buses compared to last year; and 12 additional bus drivers have been hired. There are currently 44 teacher vacancies, up from 32 at this time last year.
- **Public Comment**: Individuals who wish to participate during the portion of the meeting designated for public comment shall sign up with the presiding officer or designee before the meeting begins as specified in the Board's procedures on public comment and shall indicate the agenda item on which they wish to address the Board. *BED(LOCAL)*

In public comments, Margia Fox-Flores shared her experience with the Community Outreach Center (COC), stating that after initially dropping out, the support and resources provided by the COC enabled her to return and complete her diploma. She is now enrolled at Odessa College. Julius Hall also spoke, noting that he struggled in a traditional school environment but found flexibility and encouragement through Ector Acceleration Academies, which helped him stay on track to earn his diploma. Both speakers expressed gratitude for the alternative educational options available to them.

#### **Bond 2023**

**Bond 2023 Update**: Associate Superintendent of District Operations Dr. Anthony Sorola and Chief Financial Officer Albessa Chavez provided the Board of Trustees with an update on the progress of Bond 2023 projects.

**New Middle School – West Odessa**: Construction continues to progress. Walls are up, and the project is approximately 21% complete.

**Career & Technical Education Center**: Visible progress is being made. Building pads are nearly complete, and rebar is being tied for foundation work.

**Transition Learning Center**: Design is finalized. A contractor is being recommended to the school board.

**Permian High School Auditorium**: Construction is underway. Utility work occurred throughout the summer in the parking lot. Inside the building, a wall has been constructed to separate the work zone from student areas.

**PHS JROTC Facility**: Earthwork is in progress, and foundation preparation is underway.

**Ag Farm**: Design is finalized. A contractor is being recommended to the school board.

**PA, Bell, Alarm, and Clock Systems**: Eight schools have completed system refreshes. Cabling is set to begin at Downing, Buice, and West Elementary.

**Security Cameras**: ECISD Police now monitors three surveillance camera walls. Installation of new cameras across schools is 50% complete.

**Musical Instruments**: A total of 1,408 instruments have been ordered; 1,080 have been received. Expenditures total \$2.6 million.

**Risers**: Middle school risers are scheduled for installation by the end of the fall semester.

**Financial Update**: Approximately \$51 million (12%) has been spent to date and an additional \$199 million (47%) is encumbered through requisitions for specific projects.

No action required.

<u>School</u>: Moved by Thayer, seconded by Stanley to approve the Naming of the New Middle School as presented. A local, board-appointed naming committee began its work in July, reviewing approximately 80 name suggestions and 30 mascot ideas. Following several months of thoughtful consideration, the committee selected **Adela & Gilbert Vasquez Middle School** as the school's official name. The school's mascot will be the **Diamondbacks**. Adela and Gilbert Vasquez devoted their lives to education and public service in Odessa, leaving a lasting legacy in the community.

TASB Local Policy Update 125 includes recommended revisions to legal framework documents based on regulatory changes, including amendments to the Texas Administrative Code for five local policies and one new local policy is recommended for adoption.

<u>EFB (LOCAL) – Instructional Resources: Library Materials</u>: Moved by Stanley, seconded by Woodall to approve Revisions to Local Board Policy: EFB (LOCAL) – Instructional Resources: Library Materials as presented. This revision is based on Senate Bill 13 and changes to how library materials are selected and challenged. The District will continue to use the existing library materials advisory committee; the role of the school board in approving adoption/acquisition of new library materials is the biggest change.

This revision aliens with House Bill 1481 and the ban on the students' use of personal electronic devices. The ECISD Code of Conduct addresses student consequences for not following this new rule.

<u>Piscussion of and Request for Approval of Application to Renew Optional Flexible School Day Program (OFSDP)</u>: Moved by Miller, seconded by Stanley to approve Application to Renew Optional Flexible School Day Program (OFSDP) as presented. The Optional Flexible School Day Program (OFSDP) provides students with flexible scheduling to help them earn a high school diploma while allowing the district to receive attendance-based funding. Its two main goals are to support students at risk of dropping out or who have already dropped out and to help students recover credits lost due to poor attendance. The program is offered at the Community Outreach Center, Ector Acceleration Academy, and on campus. This year, 338 students were either recovered or prevented from dropping out; 120 graduated, and 126 (73%) are continuing their education.
