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Extended School Day Program Mission Statement

Mission Statement

The Denton ISD Extended School Day Program's mission is to ensure our students have the opportunity for educational, recreational and enrichment programs. This program provides a supervised environment that promotes safety, responsibility and community involvement. The program's goals are to provide a program that addresses the immediate safety needs of students attending school in the Denton ISD by:

- Providing academic and enrichment/recreation programs that will challenge all students who would benefit from extended school day activities
- Providing a flexible program that can fit the needs of our students and those of today's busy parents
- Developing each child's confidence, leadership and achievements through participation in educational and enrichment/recreational activities
- Helping students better relate to others and recognize the differences that make a person unique by working and playing together

We realize that parents' schedules are rarely the same as a school's schedule. We also realize that many students leave school each day and return home to spend hours of unsupervised time in front of the television. In our supervised extended school day program at all elementaries within the Denton ISD, students participate in academic enrichment, recreational activities and homework study/tutoring time.

Program Growth

The Denton ISD Extended School Day Program began in 2002 with just one school. EP Rayzor which was our pilot school with 76 participants. Now, 13 years later, our program maintains approximately 950-1000 students and encompasses all 22 elementary schools within Denton ISD. We work with well over 3000 students each school year. Our staff has grown from 5 instructors to almost 90. We began the program with the program director and we now have three program coordinators. Our sites are divided into three zones which encompass the 380 corridor, the Lantana area, and central Denton.

The Extended School Day program has plans to grow in the coming school years. Starting in the 2016-2017 school year, ESD hopes to implement a middle school program to ease the transition between elementary and middle school. ESD also hopes to start a summer program in the summer of 2016.

Prior to the implementation of these programs, Extended School Day will complete surveys with the community to determine what specific needs should be met with these programs.

Extended School Day Program Zones and Newsletter

As Extended School Day has continued to grow and develop, we strive to ensure the quality and safety of or program with the use of 3 coordinators. The coordinators work closely with campus administrators and staff, ESD instructors, parents, and ESD participants. Each coordinator is assigned a zone with 6/7 campuses. 

Curriculum Enhancement Program

Curriculum Enhancement Summary

The Extended School Day program is always trying to enhance the environment in which our children are learning. We accomplish this through various techniques. We enhance the curriculum by creating an environment that utilizes total learning. Research has proven that students using both sides of their brain are more engaged learners and therefore better learners. The teachers of these students are also better teachers because they provide a visually, socially, and emotionally enriched curriculum.

The ESD participants are engaged in daily activities that cover a wide array of enrichment areas. Our instructors use various sources to develop their lesson plans. The staff is trained in partnership with the district. We have brought in members from Library Services, Counseling, Technology, and the Special Education department to build the skills of our staff to provide a more total learning experience for our ESD participants.

With guidance from the program director, the three ESD coordinators compiled an Activity Guide to assist the instructors with lesson planning and implementation this year. This 800+ page guide is filled with various activities for each of the topics we study in ESD. It has craft activities, athletic activities, and enrichment activities. The ESD instructors use this guide to plan their lessons for each week. Each campus has a copy of the guide for the instructors' reference during activities.

In most of our elementary schools, ESD utilizes the computer labs. Enrollment and Registration 2014-2015

Enrollment and Registration

So far this school year, the Extended School Day program has serviced 3,949 students. As of February 17, 2015, there are 954 students registered and participating in the Extended School Day Program. At each school, the Kindergarten and 1st Grade classes have a maximum enrollment of 16 in order to ensure safety and quality of care. In our larger schools, the Kindergarten and 1st grade classes are separate, with a maximum of 16 in each class. Those schools include Blanton, Cross Oaks, Hawk, McNair, Paloma Creek, Pecan Creek, Providence, and Savannah. The remaining 14 elementary schools have a combined Kindergarten and 1st Grade class. The 2nd/3rd grade classes have a maximum enrollment of 22 students. Where the demand is higher and space is available, we have a second 2nd/3rd grade class that can accommodate up to 15 students. Campuses with a second 2nd and 3rd grade class are EP Rayzor, Hawk, and Pecan Creek. 4th/5th grade classes at all schools are combined, and they are open to 22 students at each school. As the Extended School Day program grows, we continually strive to update and refine the registration process. With the continued development of our registration process, we broke the registration process into two parts, beginning in April of 2012. This provided parents with the opportunity to secure their program spot online and complete the registration process at a designated location on a designated day. Beginning with the 2015-2016 program registration, we are very excited to announce our fully online registration process. Parents will be able to register their child(ren) for ESD fully on the computer. This will alleviate the problems associated with in-person registration like camping out and long wait times. Parents will secure their position in the program exactly like they did for pre-registration but, new this year, they will complete all of their paperwork at the same time. We are excited to roll this out and we know the parents will be just as excited.

^{**}The Extended School Day program at these schools has very low to no enrollment due to the free Communities in Schools program being offered at the campus.

^{***}This program has an extensive waiting list due to limited space availability. ESD shares space with two other after school programs with student enrollment exceeding 200 students. This prohibits us from expanding the program on this campus.

Tuition and Scholarships

There is a one-time fee of \$55 to register each child in the Extended School Day Program. Tuition is \$175 per month, per child. Broken down by week, it comes to about \$47.08 per week or \$9.41 per day. Children that enroll in the middle of the month pay a pro-rated tuition for the number of days they will be attending.

The Extended School Day program does offer assistance through scholarships to families that are experiencing a hardship, medical emergency, or other family crisis. As reflected in this past school year, the majority of scholarship requests come from Title I schools. At our Title I schools, we try to help families by offering them a scholarship (either full or partial), or referring them to Communities in Schools, depending on the type and length of assistance needed. The director reviews the information to determine the scholarship award. For families in need, we can provide payment plans throughout the month. So far in the 2014-2015 school year, the Extended School Day program has made approximately 33 arrangements with various families for tuition. Our program is dedicated to providing after-school care to all families that desire/need it so we make every effort possible to create a payment arrangement when necessary.

In the 2015-2016 school year, the one-time registration fee will be \$55.00. Tuition will be \$180 per month. Increases in tuition are necessary for staff salaries, staff training, and supply budgets.
