
National Shake Out October 18th

The Instructional Coaches have been busy during the month of October. We have attended several webinars such as Branching Minds, McGraw Hill Wonders. The benefits of attending the McGraw Hill Wonders webinar is that we will begin using this program that will be beneficial for our Tier 3 and low Tier 2 students during the small group using the PDSA focus folder that was recently presented by Mrs. Hunsaker. The coaches also provided professional development to all staff in creating and utilizing focus folders for in class T3 support during small group instruction. The next focus will be in progress monitoring T1 and high T2 in math. This month we had a few new students who recently entered school so we had them take the AimsWeb test and the students that scored under 25% under the SRF had to take the phonic screener test. Currently, we have 7 intervention support teachers that are pulling 2 groups and 2 intervention support teachers that are pulling 1 group. We are presently on our 2nd Intervention PDSA cycle and will be starting our 3rd PDSA cycle at the beginning of November.

On October 13th we supported the 5th grade team as they hosted the Literacy night of having a Haunted House.

Napi has hosted 2 SLT teams following the feedback loop using the proposed agenda for leadership and teams to share information between grade level teams, leadership, and district teams.

At this time Mrs. Wagner has 3 active coaching cycles in the 4th grade while Mrs. Bragg is working with 2 active coaching cycles in the 5th grade. The principals and coaches have actively started walkthroughs, and gathering data for our continuous improvement cycle.

The focus for this month Spookinaapi Specials was Effective Communication because October is National Bully Prevention Month. In order to keep the students engaged and interested in the lesson I acted out a series of scenarios that related to the different ways a person can be a speaker, listener, and communicate by body language, It was quite fun for the students to see me act, as it made them giggle, laugh, or just participate. Students learned that a speaker can be passive, aggressive, or assertive. It was important for them to visually see and hear the different ways a person can deliver a message. We also talked about how unmanaged emotions can affect the way a person communicates. That it's important to manage their emotions no matter what

they are experiencing to have respectful and appropriate interaction with others. We also discussed how equally important it is to have good listening skills and how practicing both with intention can create effective communication. Understanding these healthy and positive communication styles will eliminate conflict and produce healthy relationships with others.

Spookinaapi also helped plan and prepare for Red Ribbon Week with the other Specialists. During the week of Red Ribbon Week, helped deliver incentives for students and staff.
