Subject: Board Communication

Family & Consumer Science and FCCLA – Ashley McIlravy

Courses:

Principles of Education – Students completed the semester by examining skills that are needed for different careers. We also worked on communication skills, including verbal, written, and non-verbal.

Dollars and Sense – Students in this course completed the semester by learning about the impact that their career choice has on the lifestyles and the income that they can expect. We also looked at factors that impact their success on the job, including use of social media and proper job attire. **Fashion Design** – In this course, students completed the semester by studying job skills that will be necessary in the future. This includes searching for jobs, completing job applications, learning about job interviews, and what it takes to maintain employment once they get the job.

Lifetime Nutrition and Wellness – Students in this course completed the semester by learning how to read food labels, review reading recipes, and use basic math skills to half and double recipes. They also participated in several food labs where they learned to make muffins, monkey bread, and biscuit pizzas.

Interior Design – Students in this course completed their comprehensive first semester design project where they were given certain specifications for the home they were required to design for their potential client using the Chief Architect software.

English - Dooley

English I

We will be working on instructional and informational writing. We took a Grammar and Spelling Benchmark that was a 2-in-1 test that contained not only questions about grammar and spelling but also directions to see if their actually read them. The test was used to see which parts of speech need to be reviewed. We will be writing an information piece on something that the students are interested in (hobbies, sports, video games, etc.) and think that I know nothing about. We will talk about audience and how to write to the people who are actually going to read the writing. We are going to talk about grammar and make sure that sentence structure is sound. It will lead into our very writing intensive couple of months to prepare for the EOC Exam.

Pre-AP English I

We will be working on instructional and informational writing, but a little more in-depth than the regular classes. The students will do both an informational piece about something they are interested in, but they will also be creating an instructional piece about an advance part of speech or punctuation. We will also have a very writing intensive course this semester, but Pre-AP will also be reading a set of short stories by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle. It will help them to read and write at a higher level while also preparing for the EOC Exam.

English II

English II is in an intensive persuasive writing unit. Students are writing daily and then analyzing, evaluating and improving their writing.

Pre AP English II

I am very excited about a unit we are leading into with our study of nonfiction literature and informational articles. Next, the students will study and practice the use of rhetoric through a campaign. The students will create a product or service, prepare a proposal, promote it with advertising, and analyze each other's projects in critical reviews. In between these units, we will practice timed writings, and continue bell work consisting of journal entries and daily oral language practices. Like the English IV students, Pre AP students are now taking turns preparing their own vocabulary PowerPoint for the class to view to study for our weekly vocabulary quizzes.

English III Board Notes for January

English IV

We are starting out the new semester with nonfiction and informational texts. They students are learning about the parts and qualities of an essay. We will be viewing articles and other expository texts for the elements of effective communication, testing for bias, and synthesizing

different sources of information. This will lead into the research paper in the next unit. Students are now taking turns preparing their own vocabulary PowerPoint for the class to view to study for our weekly vocabulary quizzes. Daily work still includes journal entries and daily oral language activities (grammar).

<u>Math – Marissa Cabrales</u>

The math classes are taking the TAKS benchmarks this semester. We have the results and we will look at the scores more closely during our teacher in-service. We will set up a tutorial schedule for all students that did not score above 60%.

Mrs. Zatopek's classes:

Algebra 1 We are currently covering the exponent rules (Product Rule, Quotient Rule, Power Rule). We will move on to cover Exponential Growth and Exponential Decay towards the end of next week and then take our unit test. We have three more units after the completion of the current unit before we will have covered all of the TEKS for the STAAR Exam.

Mr. Lortz's classes:

Geometry: We have begun the unit on similarity, which started with the concepts of ratios and proportions and we are now addressing how to prove polygons are similar.

<u>AP Calculus</u>: We completed our initial investigations into differential calculus and have begun an exploration of integral calculus. We commenced the semester with a study of anti-differentiation and are now discussing summation forms and their application to the accumulation of area under a curve.

<u>Algebra 2</u>- We have continued our lesson over Quadratic Functions. We have used them to model real life situations using satellites and the focal point of a parabola and/or the path an object takes when it is thrown, hit or dropped.

<u>Pre-Calculus</u>- We are continuing our study over trigonometry. This week we will be looking at tangent and secant graphs.
