

CRES Board Report: June 2016

- CRES 2015-2016 Goals
 - 100% of CRES students will demonstrate growth in Reading and Math as measured by the Spring 2016 STAR Enterprise assessment.
 - CRES 3rd through 6th graders will score at or above the state average in proficiency on the 2016 Minnesota Comprehensive assessments in math and reading
 - CRES students will receive 25% fewer referral notices for behaviors in the areas of defiance, disrespect, and harassment in 2015-16 than the number of referrals students received in 2014-15.
 - CRES students will have access to programming that further develops their use of technology, collaboration, and critical thinking skills to solve real-world problems.
- Allison Larsen, Jane Moore, Tammy Hawkinson, and Angela Holmwig, along with Dale Sova, put on one great week-long activity at CRES during the week of June 13th. Camp Invention provided students with many great learning activities that align with our STEAM education vision. Forty-six CRES students took a week out of their summer vacation to participate in the event. What a great success, and what a great experience for the kids and the adults alike!
- Craig Lubovich led a group that provided a great send-off for our graduating sixth graders on the last day of school. The group raised money to provide a carnival for the students to attend. This was a very memorable way for our sixth graders to spend their last day at CRES.
- Our student behavior data is complete. According to the numbers, 75.8% of CRES students received zero or one Incident Report during the 2015-2016 school year. The goal for PBIS schools is 80%. Another 12% of students received two to five reports. The goal is 14%. Students who received six or more reports included 12.2% of students. The goal is 6%.
- The custodians at CRES, Lester Van Horn, Jeremy Lentz, and Phil Milhoover, are making great early progress with their summer cleaning, painting, repairing, etc. They make a great team.
- Pillars outside the front entrance and the playground entrances are being refaced with brick, as the old, original tiles are beginning to fall off. This will give the front entrance a needed, fresh look.
