Family & Consumer Science and FCCLA – Ashley McIlravy

Courses:

Principles of Education – After studying the history of education, students have now studied what it takes to be a good teacher/trainer. This includes qualities, aptitudes, and characteristics of effective teachers, issues that impact education, roles and responsibilities of teachers, and what is expected of teachers.

Dollars and Sense – Students in this course have learned about setting goals, managing priorities and are now on to studying about cash flow statements and net worth. To demonstrate their abilities, students have used Microsoft Excel to produce statements of net worth using cash flow statements from "clients."

Fashion Design – During the last month in this course, students have learned about the business of fashion. This includes import/exports, business structures, and beginning to create their own fashion company.

Lifetime Nutrition and Wellness – Students in this course have learned the basic principles of food preparation throughout the past month. To demonstrate their knowledge, they have participated in several food labs. They also have researched and taught the class about different decades in the food industry.

Interior Design – Students have learned the Principles and Elements of Design and implemented them by producing a design of a Master Bedroom for their "client" using the Chief Architect software. We are now studying what influences our housing choices, color choices, and factors that impact the housing market.

FCCLA:

Membership – We are currently holding our membership drive. We have 50 members as of 10/3/14 which is an increase from last year.

Projects - We will be hosting the Fall Leadership Workshop at AHS on 10/6. We have 3 other schools that will be attending: Saint Jo, Muenster, and Farmersville.

English – Dawn Dooley

English I – Mrs. Bradford

We will be finishing up with the non-fiction unit and moving into poetry. During the poetry unit, we will utilize the TPCASSTT method to break down the poems and find their meanings. After poetry, which should be 2 weeks at the most, we will begin the mystery unit. The mystery unit is designed to help student with inferences, which seems to be a struggle for all age groups. We will read *And Then There Were None* or *Ten Little Indians* by Agatha Christie. This should take us into the beginning of November.

English II – Mrs. Deaver

In English II, we are in the middle of a poetry unit. Students have written some very good sonnets. Some of them were quite humorous while others were very full of emotion. Students have completed their first major paper and first unit test. We will be completing our study of analyzing poetry and move into a study of drama in the next couple of weeks.

In Pre AP English II, the students are off to a quick start and a hefty reading schedule. We are diving in to the novel <u>Life of Pi</u> in order to study the art of narrative storytelling, culture, and taking an opportunity for self-reflection. The kids are working very hard to keep up with the reading/annotating schedule and are doing a magnificent job in classroom discussion. This novel will lead into their annual research paper. For this course, the students will research a culture's literary traditions. Meanwhile, each week we study grammar rules using Daily Oral Language exercises in addition to 10 vocabulary words. Give these Pre AP kids a handshake if you see them and tell them you appreciate their dedication to the AP program because it is not for the faint of heart! (Ms. Judd)

English III – Ms. Dooley

- -read short stories by Twain, London, Chopin, and Thurber
- -analyze for literary elements such as characterization, theme, point-of-view, and irony
- -test over short story elements
- -literary analysis essay: C/C two of the stories we read for lit. elements
- -book report presentations
- -sentence structure, revising and editing
- -begin pre-reading activities for *The Crucible*

English IV- Ms. Judd

In English IV, we have already journeyed through the Anglo-Saxon period and read the epic, <u>Beowulf</u>. The students loved visualizing the monster, Grendel, reflecting on the concept of heroism, and finding out about early British culture. We have now entered the Middle Ages and are reading "The Prologue" of <u>The Canterbury Tales</u> by Geoffrey Chaucer. They are good at

calling out characters who aren't as noble as they should be. We will wrap up this study with an expository essay: "What do women really want?" using the Wife of Bath's tale as a jumping off point. You may hear this question asked in your household if you have a son in this class as part of his research for the essay. It is always fun to discuss/grade these. In addition, students have been working several days a week on grammar skills using Daily Oral Language exercises as bell ringers. We also have 10 weekly vocab. words that the students use in context in order to learn them, rather than simply memorizing definitions. They know every Friday is vocab. quiz day!

We have addressed many needs this year to include the purchase of new sousaphones, fantastic music writing and upgraded our percussion section and teacher greatly. However, as I have learned through the years, nothing is guaranteed in life. We will have 5 performances at CH Collins in the next three weeks. We will be competing this Saturday in a Prelims / Finals competition for US Bands. We will perform at 10:15am and sometime in the evening.
