

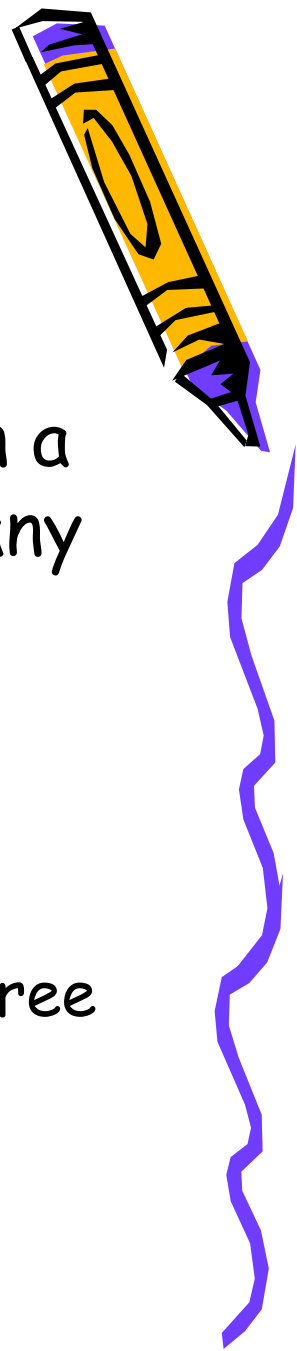

Title I School Improvement



- School improvement status begins when a school does not meet AYP targets for any subgroup for 2 consecutive years
- Sanctions:
 - **School Choice** = students can go to another school
 - **Supplemental Education Services (SES)** = free tutoring



Shaver Elementary



- 08-09-Did not meet AYP
- 09-10
 - 1st Year School Improvement (School Choice)
 - Met AYP
- 10-11
 - Holding year (School Choice)
 - Did not meet AYP
- 11-12-School Choice and SES



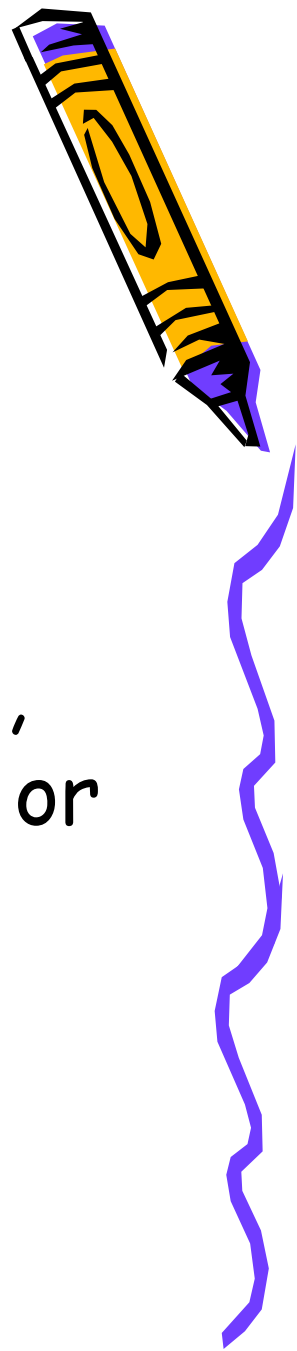
What is SES?



- What is it?
- Free Tutoring for low-income kids at Shaver
- Parents choose the tutoring company from a group of ODE-approved providers
- Parkrose SES is an approved provider, but we must also offer access to others.
- **Parent choice is the guiding principle.** Districts must not favor one provider over another.



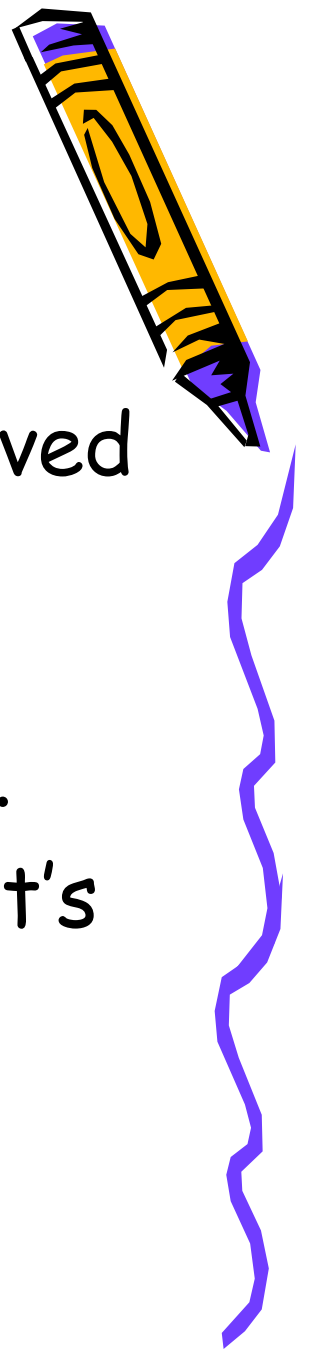
When does SES take place?



- Outside of the school day.
- Most providers offer after-school, but some offer week-end, summer or even 24/7, if an online provider.



Where does SES take place?



- It can be at Shaver, with an approved facility use application.
- The district cannot automatically exclude providers from the school.
- Libraries, other sites, even student's home



How is it set up?



- Only students at Shaver can get SES tutoring.
- Students who choose to leave Shaver under School Choice do not get SES tutoring.
- ODE calculates an annual "per student" amount for SES. Each student who elects SES can get tutoring until the "per student" amount is spent.
- Districts with schools in the 2nd year of sanctions must set aside 20% of their whole Title I allocation to pay for SES and School Choice transportation.



More about SES



- The district must offer at least 2 sign-up times for SES during the school year.
- The district must promote access to SES tutoring. We will host an SES provider "fair," so that parents can learn about providers in a direct way.
- SES providers contract with the district and invoice the district for services.



Lessons learned from other districts



- SES providers will actively recruit students
- Not all SES providers are highly qualified educators
- SES providers offering laptops to access online curriculum are difficult to resist.
- Watch the contract carefully.
