After two full months of implementing our KW/Vina daily "Attendance Matters" calendar routine within each PreK, K, and 1st grade classroom we are happy to be receiving some positive input from our classroom teachers. Teachers have shared that the new daily routine has really made their students aware and celebrate when 90% of their class is in attendance at school, and students are looking forward reaching their class attendance goal. This daily routine was implemented to catch those Tier II attendance students who provide critical input and can have influence on their parent/guardian about being present at school each day. During the month of March we honored 15 classes who earned a "Free

Recess" for having 3 or more 90% attendance days during the school week.

This month we also celebrated three classrooms that had the greatest percentage of attendance during the month of February. Ms. Shea's PreK classroom was honored, Ms. Shooter's kindergarten classroom, and Miss Whitney's first grade classroom.

### Early Kindergarten/Preschool

In honor of National Read Aloud Day on March 1st, we started the month with a Family Fun Friday Dr.Seuss read aloud. Our children loved the rhyme and repetition of the Dr. Seuss books and our parents enjoyed reading aloud to their children. We had a special Dr. Seuss snack--green pudding and green juice. Our classrooms were visited by leprechauns the day before St. Patrick's Day. Our students were quite excited and on high alert for leprechaun sightings all day. We never saw or caught one but we saw the tricks that they played in our

classrooms. The excitement was absolutely precious. This month we learned about the Earth and Sky. More specifically we learned what happens when day turns to night, what happens when the weather changes, what changes in each season and how to take care of

the Earth. In Math our Pre-K students are counting to 20 and beyond, subitizing to 4, recognizing numerals from 0-9, and combining sets to equal 6,7,8,9,10. Our students are blending 2 and 3 phonemes, learning letter sounds and identifying/producing rhymes. We administered the OWL progress monitoring assessment and our children are showing significant growth academically. We are looking forward to sharing this progress with parents during P/T conferences.




### Kindergarten (Submitted by: Kelley Sharp)

### Kindergarten Isip Data March 2019


Kindergarten - Overall Reading





# SAFETY MATTERS (School)

During the month of March the KW/Vina MBI Team held our second planning day with Kelly Wilson, a PBIS Consultant provided to us through our MPDG (Preschool Development Grant) to provide training and support to classroom teachers in identifying Tier II behavior students within their classrooms, as well as implementing classroom procedures and expectations with fidelity. She was then able to present to our staff members about the Top 5 Classroom Practices to impact student behavior. This professional development was held on March 20th at our Extended Wednesday, and we have already seen teachers implement the TOP 5! This is exciting for our campus and for our students. We are planning to have Kelly Wilson back at KW/Vina in May to assist the MBI Leadership Team to outline our Tier III student supports. During the month of March we again saw a decline in the number of behavior referrals. March had only 13 behavior referrals which was down from 18 in the month of February. The KW/Vina campus has seen a 54% decline in behavior referrals since January!

The MBI team and staff at KW Bergan/Vina Chattin Elementary Campus have been collaboratively working to finish the year strong. We learned 2 new animals Spoopi- Turtle, and Miisinski- Badger, and their importance and meaning to Native American people. Next month we hope the weather warms up and we may go outside and play some traditional games, and see the signs of spring.

This month in March as always we practiced our numbers and colors. We are adding the days of the week and calendar in Blackfeet. We have learned how to say "March" in the language, the students also know the literal meaning behind the months name. The students engage in numerous art projects to help them remember what we've worked on in class. I'm hoping to get them started with pictographs when the weather stays warmer. With the new spring weather we've been having I have been taking them outside to play traditional games; their favorites are "run and scream" and "make the stick jump". Some of the classes got to make "hoop and stick" and enjoyed seeing which one can make the most sticks in their hoops. The students love these games and enjoy the history and stories that go along with the them. I'm hoping by the end of the month we can be making our own games and taking them outside to play; one game I'm waiting to make is stick game. We also had a light scavenger hunt at the beginning of the month using their colors. I see huge growth in our students with their Blackfoot Language, almost every class knows their colors and can count to 10 (our goal is 20 by the end of the year.) We will be continuing animals this month and next month and hopefully will be collaborating with the immersion school for sign language.

It's amazing to see 344 pre-kindergarten, kindergarten and 1st graders respond so well during our drills. I always worry about the loud alarm triggering students affected by trauma but the students remain calm throughout the drill. Our safety team meets immediately after the drills to see what worked well and what can be improved upon so and it definitely shows through the students' excellent behavior during these drills. I can't express enough about the schedule that was implemented for me. It was the best because I can be in one building and fully focus on those students during those times. It is also very helpful to have the referral system so we are able to track and make sure students are being seen when they are referred by staff. Our MBI Team had an inservice done by Kelly Wilson who presented on Tier 2 Supports. We have these in place she just helped us fine tune them and make sure they are implemented with integrity.
