1. <u>Fulfilling the Strategic Plan</u> — Many activities in which the Multicultural Education Department has been actively engaged on a consistent basis are specified in Strategy 3 of the District 97 Strategic Plan. To date, those Action Steps focus primarily in Strategies 3 and 4.

a. <u>Strategy 3</u> We will establish a culture of inclusion that respects and promotes diversity

- <u>Result 1:</u> Establish an environment that celebrates differences (Actions Steps: 1, 2, 4, and 6).
- <u>Result 2:</u> Establish a Diversity Leadership Network (Action Steps: 1, 2, 3, and 4)
- **Result 3:** Establish district-wide diversity goals one of which called for rotating cultural exhibits to the schools (Action steps 1 and 2)
- <u>Result 4:</u> Substantially increase the use of the MCRC (Action Steps 3, 5, and 6)
 - ➤ Partnerships with VOP Community Relations Department, Fellowship Community Services, Thrive Center, Oak Park YMCA, Volunteer Center, Oak Park and River Forest High School, CEDA, Representative LaShawn Ford, and Ten Thousand Villages Oak Park
 - ➤ Support for cultural groups and activities with church groups (1st United and Fellowship Community), parent groups (FAASt, APPLE, SEA)
 - Working with professors, teachers and students from the following colleges and universities: Loyola, Concordia, Roosevelt and Kennedy King.
 - ➤ MCRC Library Statistics: circulation, facilities use and patron information
- <u>Result 7:</u> Provide diversity training for staff and students (Action Steps 1, 3, and 6)
 - New teacher orientation / Why Cultural Proficiency is an important characteristic for people throughout education and educational institutions
 - ➤ Updating of the D97 Holocaust curriculum Teaching the University 97 – Holocaust class (completed our 3rd year teaching this class)
 - Presentations to various faculties on an "as needed" basis
 - > Salad Bowl newsletter

- ➤ Working with individual teachers to address specific issues in the classroom: the N" word, racial slurs against various ethnic or cultural groups
- ➤ Working with principals to address specific cultural or diversity issues in the classroom with teachers
- Result 8: Maximize interaction between special education and general education students, including such MSAN initiatives as F.L.O.W. and Summer Student Empowerment which include Special Ed students; and *The Martin Luther King Health Challenge* held at OPRF High School which incorporated *West Suburban Special Recreation Department* activities for children with and without disabilities
- Result 13: Offer Parents/Guardians and students individualized support, as needed, through mentoring programs. (Action Step 1 included F.L.O.W. for young men and women, Summer Student Empowerment, and Friday Night Place)

b. <u>Strategy 4</u> Ensure learning experiences that develop the whole child to accomplish our missions

- Result 1: Increase interdisciplinary projects (involving librarians, classroom, music, art, and gym teachers). Also includes Action Step 6.
 - Latin American dance classes for all grades at Lincoln
 - ➤ Walking/Day Trips
 - > Standing reservations: World Music, French and Spanish classes at Julian
 - ➤ Frequent reservation: Social Studies, Art, Language Arts classes at Julian and Brooks
- Result 4: Integrate a progressive education philosophy into learning activities (through experiential learning, teacher as guide, student collaboration and opportunities for choice). Action Steps 5, 7, 8, and 9
- <u>Result 5:</u> Provide a variety of after-school enrichment programs (Action Steps 4 and 6)
 - ➤ Girls F.L.O.W. (15 girls Julian only; 2009 2010 school year)
 - ➤ FNP Girls Volleyball Initiative (10 girls Julian only; Spring 2010) Partnership with Loyola Law School professor and student coaches
 - Summer Student Empowerment (56 students –
 Julian and Brooks; summer currently in progress) –
 partnership with Elmhurst College's Golden Apple
 program Illinois Literacy Workshops

- Recruited students for the UIC Young Men's Writing Workshop
- ➤ Recruited students for the UIC Young Women's writing workshop
- **Result 9:** Expand age-appropriate opportunities for all students to participate in art, music, drama, dance, world languages, and physical curricular activities. (Action Steps 1, 2 3, and 4)

- 3. Resource development for staff Many of the Multicultural Education Department's presentations and field trips are topics initially requested by faculty members and then expanded to other classrooms and schools. When teachers are looking for cultural information to incorporate into their classroom lessons, the MC Ed Department develops materials for their use or to present in classrooms, assemblies and field trips. These included: cultural units on slavery, El Dia de los Muertos, Arab Americans, Francophone countries, Patsy Mink, Manzanar, Human Commonality, American Cultures, The Holocaust, the Tuskegee Airmen, and Bullying.
