



FES 2024-2025 E-Learning Day Plan

The first school closure due to inclement weather is a "hold-harmless" day. There is no requirement to make it up and will not be an e-learning day. Weather-related school closures after the first day will be e-learning days, to the extent possible. This will prevent the need for them to be made up and allow us to continue progressing in student learning.

- Some guidelines for FES e-learning day instruction are:
 - Direct, synchronous instruction (virtually meeting with a teacher) is not a requirement.
 - School devices may be sent home with students in advance of a possible e-learning day. If sent home, they must be returned on our first day back for in-person learning.
 - Reading and math activities will always be provided. Activities in other subject areas may be provided.
 - The amount of instruction and school work suggested may not be equivalent to an in-person day.
 - The amount of school work will be consistent within each grade level, but not every grade level will be the same. The older the student, the higher our expectations will be.
 - If not communicated in advance, assignments may be shared with students and families online using SeeSaw or by teacher email.
 - Students may have assignments utilizing IXL and other apps and programs on their assigned school devices and paper/pencil activities. These could include a choice board of options, downloadable worksheets, etc.
 - Student attendance for e-learning days will be based on evidence of student engagement. For a student to be marked as "present" on an e-learning day, the teacher would need to see by the next school day, that the student completed their assigned school work. Some examples are: completing assigned work in IXL, a parent's signature on a choice board saying that the student completed the needed activities, finishing and returning a worksheet, etc.

- Special education teachers may assign alternative work (choice boards, individual work, or assignments on devices) if students are not able to complete the classroom activities for the day.
