Project Summary

As the demand for skilled-trades people continue to grow, and there remains a significant gap in the availability of qualified individuals to fill these roles, and the probability rate of recidivism, a partnership was formed. Recognizing this need, Building Poder-Power established a Pre-Apprenticeship Program for Skilled-Trades. This program aims to equip individuals with foundational knowledge, practical skills, and hands-on-learning, paired with classroom learning that is necessary to pursue successful careers in various skilled-trades. Building Poder-Power's ultimate goal is to help communities create and expand economic opportunities.

Over the course of 12-week sessions, participants will then become the driving force with comprehensive training and begin to transition into life-skills mastery. Through this method, communities and our participants begin to create sustainability practices that catapults change and everyday comforts.

The project involves transforming a condemned school building into a vibrant center for a pre-apprenticeship program, creating valuable training opportunities for young people in skilled trades. This revitalized facility will serve as both an educational hub and a sustainable business model, offering hands-on training in fields such as carpentry, plumbing, electrical work, and green building practices. To ensure ongoing revenue, the facility will incorporate commercial workshops and event spaces available for community rentals and skill-based public workshops. By combining education with a sustainable revenue strategy, this project will support workforce development, workforce housing and enhance community engagement, and preserve the building as a community asset.

Objectives:

- 1. Bridge the Gap: Address the shortage of skilled-trade workers by preparing individuals for apprenticeships and eventually careers in trades such as plumbing, electrical, carpentry, welding, and heating and cooling.
- 2. Empower Participants: Provide participants with hands-on experience, technical knowledge, and soft skills essential for success in the workplace.
- 3. Increase Diversity: Encourage individuals from diverse backgrounds, including women, minorities, and underprivileged communities, to explore and enter the skilled-trades industry.

- 4. Forge Partnerships: Collaborate with local trade unions, businesses, educational institutions, and government agencies to create a network of support and resources for a sustainable program.
- 5. Promote Economic Growth: Contribute to the growth of Saginaw, and other local economies by supplying a skilled workforce capable of meeting the demands of framing, electrical, plumbing and heating/cooling industries.
