Thirteen high school students in Denton Independent School District competed at the University Interscholastic League's state competition for 4-A schools in Austin with four capturing a top UIL academic award.

Student rocket team wins in world's largest rocket contest

Two students from Denton High competed in the finals of the Team America Rocket Challenge, the world's largest model rocket contest, on May 17 in Great Meadow, Virginia.

Bregg Reedy and Eric Thompson finished as the best of 13 Texas teams that made it to the finals. Reedy and Thompson finished tenth out of 643 teams and won \$3,000 in scholarships plus other prizes for being one of the Top 10 teams in the nation.

Over 6,000 students in 643 teams attempted to meet the contest's rigorous requirements, but only the top scoring 100 high school teams qualified to compete in the national contest finals.

The contest required that students design, build and test a model rocket to fly at a maximum altitude of 750 feet with total flight duration as close to 45 seconds as possible. They were required to complete the flight with a payload of two raw eggs and parachute them back to the ground unbroken.

Denton High JROTC instructor, Michael Dash, was the team supervisor.
