Curriculum

Writing curriculum is on the way. Priscilla has procured some monies from a Cheryl Bobo grant and has ordered some new 6 traits of writing curriculum. This curricular resources will be given to the teachers at the Fall teacher inservice with a training on best practice use. I am very excited to see this as we have traditionally scored low on our State assessments in the area or writing.

I am requesting that we add an additional \$25,000 to our district curriculum budget for FY19 if we can afford it. Middle School Social Studies resources need to be addressed as does 6th grade math. We also have more on-line subscriptions to pay for as we have added e-curriculum to our resources.

CPI Training

Shane Scamahorn, our Crisis Prevention and Intervention (CPI) trainer, has been working with the staff at each school site this year. This training takes two days and is well worth it. De-escalation techniques is the key to not having to physically restrain. This training teaches our staff to recognize, understand, and appropriately react to situations before, during and after an event. Our goal is to get all staff at each site trained annually.

Celebration of Learning Week

April 24th – 26th at the Thorne Bay School. We are very excited to have this opportunity for our district students participate and/or compete in events such as Bridge Engineering, Science Fair, Technology Clips, Spelling Bee, 3 on 3 Basketball Tournament, Speed Stacking, Climbing Wall, Scholastic Book Fair, and a Talent Show.
