Staff participated in two cultural in-services first semester. 1) The first one included boating, berry picking, and learning on the Nuna from a local whaling captain/wife/family 2) The second included beading and sewing skins, making mittens, and learning various traditional customs from the one and only Susan Hope. Thank you to Ira and Julie Itta, Lola Tukrook, and Susan Hope.

In addition to her work with the staff during in-service, Susan Hope with the help from Point Lay resident Lupita Henry conducted sewing intensives for high school students and introduced younger students to beading techniques for holiday ornaments. There have been numerous requests from community members, students, and staff for Susan Hope to return to Kali School and spend more time sharing her skills, knowledge, expertise, and positivity. Sewing Circles were a huge success, and we will continue to build onto these in the future.

Middle school students have started a semester-long course learning and creating traditional Native art with Ilisaurri Julie Itta.

75% of the senior class has completed all of their graduation requirements except for one class, and all of the juniors are now on track to graduate on time in May 2026.

In their freshman year, Kyanne Everett and Lovlee Henry qualified and competed in the 1A Cross Country State Meet. While they did not place in the top three this year, we are extremely proud of them and their accomplishments. Both girls are 3-sport athletes, and they contribute greatly to every team they are on. Their work ethic and leadership are evident and will only continue to grow.

In November, Point Lay hosted the 1A Mixed-6 Regionals Volleyball tournament. Thank you to Board Member Frieda Nageak, AD Steve Zanazzo, the IT crew, and KBRW's Bob Thomas for being part of the festivities and making the event more memorable for everyone. I would also like to thank the local community members for providing traditional foods for the teams.



In October, four students were invited to travel to the East Coast to Mystic Aquarium in Mystic, Connecticut for a week-long hands-on science based educational and cultural exchange program. While there, students experienced hands-on science; met with animal trainers; had opportunities to engage in beluga research that happens annually here in Point Lay while exploring and comparing the marine environment in Connecticut; participated in a cultural exchange with students from the Mashantucket Pequot Tribal Nation, and visited research centers to experience science in action. All of the students said it was an amazing, once in a lifetime opportunity. Special thanks to Lori Ferreira for chaperoning the group all the way across the nation!

#### Facility Update:

- The school bus is operational and back on the road again after being out of service for nearly 2 ½ months.
- New security cameras have been installed and are AMAZING!
- Vape sensors have been installed and configured, and I am now able to monitor them.
- There was a Declaration of Emergency in December due to a power outage in Point Lay. The school transitioned into an emergency shelter for several hours. Fortunately, the situation was resolved, and power was restored before 9:30 pm that night.
- Staffing continues to be an issue, but everyone is stepping up and doing what they can to make things work as optimally as possible.
