HMS Parent Information Night Presentation and Parent Input Summary

Vision Statement: Everything we do is in the best interest of our students—we inspire them to dream toward a better future, and we equip them with the skills necessary to achieve those dreams.

Background

- Homedale Middle School sent out a parent survey to ask what the school might need to improve upon. The main issue given was students bullying other students.
- The suggestion given by parents to help resolve this concern was to implement a stricter dress code or school uniform policy.
- Homedale Middle School administration, based on a recommendation from the school's Parent's Power Up group, was asked to research the idea of having students wear school uniforms.
- Homedale Middle School's Parent Information Night was a time to present what was discovered during the research process.

Presentation

- According to *Huffington Post* in 2013, the average cost of back to school clothing is about \$688.62.
- A student at HMS purchasing clothing items to match the proposed dress code could be as little as \$100 \$150 per student.
- Please see the attached flyer with local pricing of items matching the proposed dress code.
- Homedale Middle School will continue providing clothing and school supply assistance to students in need.
- According to research, the following are benefits of an enhanced dress code:
 - o Parent/Child arguments and related stress is reduced
 - o Classroom distractions are reduced
 - A sense of community at school is improved
 - Safety increases and violence is reduced
 - Test scores may improve
- According to local schools (Fruitland and Vallivue) who have a middle school uniform policy:
 - o Behavioral incidents and office referrals have decreased

Parent Comments Not in Support of the Idea

- Families will still need to purchase additional clothing for after-school and sporting activities which will require additional clothing costs.
- Schools, which are government run institutions, should not have a say in how families dress their children.

Parent Comments in Support of the Idea

- Schools are preparing students for the work force and most jobs/professions have a
 dress code or uniform policy.
- Schools with uniform policies have seen a significant decrease in theft and behavioral incidents.
