5.	Continuing Education (Handout attached)
	Tamara Sealy provided an update on CE enrollment and program offerings as well as grant
	and corporate training projects currently available through the CE Department.
	The BOT recently approved the Kids' College Program Lease Agreement with Fort Bend
	ISD. The program will resume full operations in summer 2022. The location has not yet been determined.

New staffing assignments in the CE Department were announced.

6. Dean of Vocational Instruction

Don Smith reported he is currently meeting with each program director in the vocational area to learn the status and needs of each program. He also reported that there are currently 6 full-time faculty vacancies within the vocational areas.

7. Distance Education (Handout attached)

Michele Betancourt provided a handout and reported that DE will be transitioning to a new/updated Learning Management System (LMS). A soft launch is scheduled for summer 2022 with full implementation fall 2022.

Michele discussed new video management/video conferencing platforms. The college has transitioned from Blackboard Collaborate to Zoom.

The DE department moved from the Wharton campus to the Richmond campus in September and is now located in room TC-103. With the move, DE now has the ability to provide more face-to-face support for faculty on an as needed (drop in) basis.

8. Guided Pathway for Success (GPS) Campus Coordinator (Handout attached)
Sara Fira provided an update on Houston GPS. She included the 2021 Houston GPS
Transfer Feedback Report and the WCJC Transfer Feedback Report for the council to review.

An updated list of Institutional Representatives including Strategy Experts and Content Experts (Meta Majors) for WCJC was provided.

9. Library (Handout attached)

Marissa Saenz provided an overview of the library services offered per campus for AY 2019/2020, 2020/2021, and 2021/2022. These services include Service Desk, Computer Lab, Library Orientation, and Library Instruction (F2F). Library Database Usage and Facility Usage data was also provided.

10. Dual Credit

Natalie Stavinoha reported a total of 539 dual credit students enrolled for fall 2021. This is down approximately 15% from fall 2019 (pre-pandemic enrollment of 634 students). Contact hours are also down approximately 13%.

Facilitators have been designated at each high school and a Facilitator's Handbook has been developed. High school faculty teaching dual credit courses are encouraged to communicate with facilitators to help keep high school students on track.

We now have two Early College High Schools, Wharton HS (ROAR) and Bay City HS.
Louise HS and Wharton HS also participate in Pathways in Technology Early College HS

(PTEC). Both schools are also offering welding. Dual Credit students will begin welding classes in fall 2022.

Welding and Automotive dual credit classes are currently being offered at El Campo HS.

11. Senior Citizens (Handout attached)

Kimberly Willis provided an overview of the services and activities offered to senior citizens through the Sr. Citizens Program. Some services include: congregate meals, Meals-On-Wheels, educational programs, games and activities, health screenings, nutritional information, and local transportation.

There are currently 204 participants in Wharton county and 91 participants in Colorado county. Of the 204 participants in Wharton county, about 50 receive delivered meals and up to 25 have participated in congregate meals.

The Sr. Citizens Program is funded through federal and regional government bodies, fund raising, and individual donations.

12. Student Success

Lindsey McPherson reported that the academic advisors and Title V staff have moved into the new Academic, Career, & Transfer Advising Center (ACT) and are now located in the library.

The advising department is very busy doing group advising, registering students, and providing online and in-person advising.

As part of the QEP and the Academic Recovery Process, Lindsey strongly encourages faculty to submit Early Warnings Alerts. This enables tracking by counselors who then contact students and provide customized strategies for improving academic progress. Proposed changes to the Disabilities Services area include revising the job description for a new Counselor/Disability Services position. This position will be posted soon with the hopes of being filled by the first of the year.

The process for accommodating students with disabilities has also been revised. The new process includes an email and paper documents (if requested) to be sent directly to the student outlining the approved accommodations. Students are responsible for contacting each instructor to discuss the accommodations. Accommodations are not retroactive and become effective upon meeting with the instructor. Handbooks and other student documents will be updated to outline the process which goes into effect spring 2022.

13. Vocational Support/Perkins (Handout attached)

Rose Ochoa provided a handout and updated the Council on the Vocational Support Services area and how funds from the Carl D. Perkins grant are allocated. In addition to instructional and educational equipment for various vocational programs, Perkins funds help eligible vocational students with textbooks, childcare, and transportation reimbursement.

Rose has created a newsletter, *Vocational Buzz*, that provides essential information to students and fosters a connection between the classroom and Vocational Support Services. The newsletter is emailed monthly to students.

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AEL Report for the Academic Affairs Council Meeting 11/19/21

- 2020-2021 "pandemic" program year (July 1, 2020-June 30, 2021): AEL met 47% of the total program enrollment target assigned by Houston Galveston Area Council (HGAC, Grant Recipient) by enrolling 538 students from July 2020 through June 2021. AEL met 92%-96% of Career Pathways target, 55% participation rate and had 11 GED graduates.
- 2021-2022 New program year 2021-2022 (July 1, 2021- June 30, 2022): AEL has
 met 52% of the total enrollment target as of October 31, 2021. AEL has excessed
 Q1 enrollment target. AEL has enrolled 500 students as of July 1, 2021. AEL has
 met 47% of Career pathway enrollment target and has 8 GED graduates so far.
- 24 remote/synchronous AEL courses and 10 F2f courses have been offered in the fall semester.

How can AEL resources assist the college?

- 1) AEL got awarded for the amount of \$87, 210 for workforce training in PY 21-22. These funds can pay student tuition, fees, and textbooks/materials for Level 1 Vocational Certificate programs and CE programs for not only the qualified AEL students but also for the credit and/or CE students if they do it through AEL. Credit and or CE students just need to sign up for an AEL orientation, take a TABE (Test of Adult Education) test, and attend the AEL support class so their tuition/fees/textbooks can be paid by AEL. Level 1 certificate program are covered 100% & CE programs are covered 90%.
- AEL can offer math, reading and writing courses to those credit students who need to build skills in these areas to be college ready. These courses can be customized to meet the students' needs.
- 3) AEL students are potential college students that could help with the college enrollment. College recruiters have an easy access to AEL classes to recruit to increase the college enrollment.

Department Updates

- CE Enrollment for Spring 2021 increased over Spring 2020; Fall 2021 enrollment numbers will be pulled at the end of our CE Quarter I which ends November 30th.
- Continued our partnership this year with Lamar CISD to offer the Certified Nurse Aide Training program to 26 high school students.
- Began offering Family Fun Activities (Cookie Decorating and Partner Painting) at the Wharton campus and will continue offering these types of classes in Wharton and Richmond in the Spring. Began offering Yoga and Strength/Fitness classes at the Wharton Fitness Center during the day; we will continue to offer these classes in the Spring and we are seeking out an evening instructor.
- Brought back in-person TSI Test Prep courses in Richmond and Wharton.
- Recently approved by the Board of Trustees for CE to enter into a lease agreement with FBISD to hold Kids' College 2022.

Grant and Corporate Training Projects

- The Skills Development Fund (SDF)-COVID Special Initiative grant has ended and is in the
 process of being closed out. That grant was designed to assist companies who had training
 needs related to COVID such as safety training, technology training to allow employees to work
 from home, or training related to a change in business operations. We partnered with 6
 companies to provide training to 43 employees and spent \$44,906.64 which comes to 39.05%
 of our total grant funds.
- We received a new Skills Development Fund (SDF) Shell Grant in the amount of \$50,000 that is open funding for companies that are private, for-profit with any type of training needs. Still working to find our first Business Partner to participate.
- Continuing our partnership with Tenaris by providing 4-8 classes per month for Tenaris employees as business ramps up and they increase hiring.
- Worked with the EMS Department to provide CPR training for the US Army Corps of Engineers in Matagorda County
- Worked with the Process Technology Department to provide operator and instrumentation training to employees as cash training.
- Previous SDF grant between TSTC and NRG in which WCJC was a training provider has been terminated; WCJC has reapplied with NRG as the grant lead. Deliverables and terms of the grant are still being reviewed by TWC and negotiated by all parties but we hope be awarded funding when we return from the Holidays.

New Video Management/Video Conferencing Platforms

- Campus transitioned from Collaborate to Zoom in August to address issues with connectivity, accessibility and storage fees
- In October upgraded all licenses to full user status to allow for full functionality including cloud storage and integration with video management software's.
- In October we acquired Yuju, a fully accessible video management and creation software that replaced several other technologies such as Ed puzzle and Screen Cast-o-matic an allows for unlimited cloud storage (including Zoom recordings).

- Training on Yuja and Zoom continuing. DE will provide both faculty focused training and campus training.







Carl D. Perkins Academic Affairs Meeting November 19, 2021

The Carl D. Perkins grant is focused on improving the academic and technical achievement of Career and Technical Education (CTE) students. Funds are allocated to Wharton County Junior College for instructional equipment, instructional resources, and student services assistance.

Vocational Support Services -

Students majoring in an Associate of Applied Science Degree or one year certificate as listed in the WCJC course catalog may be eligible for financial support. Funds are used to support or reduce out of pocket expenses for CTE students who have monetary challenges.

Who is eligible for Perkins Vocation Support Services? To be considered, students must identify as one of the following categories:

- Disabled: physical, academic, or mental disability documentation must be on file with the Office of Disability Services
- Economically Disadvantaged: also receives Pell Grant, WIA, AFDC, food stamps, Texas Public Education Grant, or proof of income below the poverty level
- ESL (English as a second language)
- Homeless individuals
- Nontraditional field of study
- Out-of-workforce individuals
- Single parent or single pregnant woman
- Youth who are in, or have aged out of, the foster care system
- Youth with a parent who is a member of the armed forces and is on active duty
