Guatemala Trip Refund Timelines

Flights - Cost of flight will not be refundable once flights are purchased. We will look into
purchasing the upgrade to have the ability to change flights and I will discuss all options with
parents about how much of an upgrade they want to ensure they can change the flight if
necessary we cancel.

Mrs. Rodas will not be reimbursing the cost of flights for cancellations. Currently, flights out of Kalamazoo with the upgrade cost around \$670.

United is offering the option to change flights without a fee if we purchase by December 31st. We will do what we can to protect the cost of the flight.

Most airlines are allowing you to switch your flight if you use it within 1 year of changing your flight date. If the flight you are changing to is cheaper, you will not be refunded the balance. If it is more expensive, you will have to pay the difference.

- Excursion, Hotel Reservations, cost of food, van, tour guides- The cost of the excursions
 and hotel reservations etc. will be refundable up to 4 weeks before our trip, or May 15, 2021.
 After May 15, 2021, Mrs. Rodas will have to look at how the cancelation affects the other
 member's price of the trip and refund what is available without increasing the price of the trip of
 the other members as cost is determined by sharing hotel rooms
- After June 1st, 2 weeks before our trip, no refunds will be available as everything will have been reserved/paid for and the cost will have been determined by the number of participants.
 - If an item can be reimbursed, it will be. Mrs. Rodas will reach out to the various reservations and see what is refundable. This includes items such as tours, or excursions that are just reserved but we are allowed to cancel.
 - Participants will still have the flexibility of their flight as provided by whatever airline and flight options we choose.

Dear School Board Members of Vicksburg Community Schools.

I am writing to ask for permission to offer a trip for only AP Spanish students to Guatemala in June 2021. Due to the Covid-19 situation, our department's originally planned trip to Spain in June 2021 has been postponed to 2022. The seniors felt that Guatemala would be a great experience for them still if we can arrange to go.

Why offer this trip?

This trip to Guatemala will require the students to communicate solely in Spanish as outside of the capital, as no one speaks English. The students will have to order, make purchases, and communicate in Spanish. It will give students an immersion experience, as well as a cultural comparison first hand, instead of only in the classroom. It supports many of the standards required by the AP class.

What we will be doing:

If approved, we will stay the night in the capital upon arrival. The next day we will start the 9 hour drive to Tikal, the largest Mayan ruins in Central America. We will spend the night and the next morning spend the whole day trekking the ruins. We will then leave and spend the night in Coban, 4 hours away from Tikal. We will visit a botanical garden and do a short hike through the area. After that we will continue our trip to Concepcion Tutuapa, where my family lives. We will spend 4 days with them. We will take small trips to different areas of the town. We will see the school, how clay bricks are made, a waterfall/river, we will cook with my mother-in-law and enjoy the immersion aspect of the trip.

Once we leave Concepcion Tutuapa, we will spend one night in Quetzaltenango. We will visit hot springs, see the Spanish plaza, do some shopping, and go out to eat in a popular restaurant with live marimba playing.

Then we will travel south towards Lake Atitlan. The largest freshwater lake in Guatemala that is surrounded by 3 volcanoes and is breathtaking. We will take a weaving course, visit the oldest church in the country, visit hot tubs created by Mayans, and much more.

After Atitlan, we will travel to Antigua, the previous capital of the country full of history. We will have the option to do a volcano hike. We will do a coffee tour, a tour of the city, try Mayan soups, and do more shopping.

Finally, we will make our way back to the capital city to spend the night before our flight home.

Transportation:

The flights we are looking at taking are out of Chicago. We will be splitting the cost to rent vehicles there and back. This way we don't have to pay for parking.

We are also looking at flights out of Kalamazoo, which would save us some of that travel cost to Chicago.

Once in Guatemala, we will rent a van and have a local drive us. The guide will be a member of my family that knows the area well (my husband's uncle). My father-in-law will also be traveling with us. These are people I have known for 10 years, and feel comfortable having them drive us around. I feel safer using them than I would someone I have not met as a tour guide.

We will be flying out of Chicago. The two airlines we are looking into using are United or American Airlines.

Safety:

Mary Zemlick, the other Spanish teacher, and I will be traveling with the group together. We will have 2 adults to the maximum of 9 kids, if they all go, at a time. This allows one of us to be free if there does happen to be an emergency.

According to the <u>travel.state.gov</u>, Guatemala is a level 3 out of 4 levels of concern for travel currently due to the Coronavirus. Travel is not restricted, but at the moment a negative Covid-19 test is required upon entry, or up to 72 hours before arrival. Guatemala is still accepting travelers and the country is open with Covid-19 protocols in place. We will wear our masks, social distance and follow all necessary protocols that are in place in June.

There is a risk of violence in the country, especially in the capital. We will be staying in secure hotels, not near the airport, with doormen and secured parking. We will only be visiting tourist areas in the capital city, and will not venture out into areas we do not know. We will exercise the same caution we would when traveling to any country.

The town of Concepcion is a very tranquil town without violence. We will walk to our destinations while in the town. The following two links show what the town looks like. It is not an impoverished town. We will have electricity, running water, hot water, and access to the internet-although it may not be the best.

Full itinerary available upon request. Still working out some of the activities with students. We won't have a full itinerary until the school board approval and first meeting with parents. A potential itinerary is listed below.

I will require that students have health insurance, or purchase insurance for the duration of this trip. There are plans as low as \$200 that I can share with students so they are covered in case of an emergency. Students/ parents also sign a power of attorney which allows me to help in case of a medical emergency.

June 23- hot springs and then depart to Panajachel
