3. What Makes Your School Special – Western Avenue School (WAS) Principal Casey O'Connell and students from Western Avenue Elementary School shared about what makes their school special. Principal O'Connell shared how wonderful the PTO at WAS is and how they recently held their annual clothing sale that started back in the 1980's. They put countless hours into preparing for this fundraiser. The students shared how they became representatives for third, fourth, and fifth grades and that they meet once a month after school. They have a buddy program with the first and second graders. The representatives planned spirit week and brainstormed ideas. There will be two more spirit weeks. The first one will be before spring break and the other at the end of the year. They also run a school store from 7:50-8:00 am each day. Each week two different grade levels go shopping. The representatives also work with Radical Love, which is a non for profit that helps people new to our country. They collect new or gently used waterproof gloves in January and hope to do another collection in the spring. Cross age coaches, which include cross age tutors, have been at WAS for ten years. This group is fifth graders who volunteer to work with younger students to learn basic math facts and sight words. SEL coaches are fourth and fifth graders who help younger students to grow their social emotional skills in different ways.

4. Seal of Biliteracy – Shonette Sims & GHS Staff

Gina Thomas shared that this program is for students who have attained a high level of proficiency in English and one or more other foreign, or world languages. The Seal of Biliteracy benefits students with recognition on their diploma as well as transcript, recognizes students as proficient in at least two languages, college credit is offered from many institutions, recognized at Senior Awards Night, and helps when applying for jobs or internships.

At 7:24 p.m., Dan Choi joined the meeting by phone.

Students can get AP credit hours by earning the Seal of Biliteracy. Some institutions also offer credit hours for students who achieve commendation, which is a step below the seal for those students that did not quite reach proficiency in both languages. Students must be tested for proficiency in reading, writing, listening, and speaking. This test is taken the second week of March during class. To take the test, students must be a junior or senior, have a 480 ELA score for SAT or a 21 composite school on the ACT, and pay a \$30 fee. To earn the seal, students must show intermediate high levels of language proficiency and for commendation they need to show intermediate low. Geneva High School students shared their experiences in the program and what their second language was.

Jackie Forbes shared that there have been thousands of bills introduced in the 104<sup>th</sup> General Assembly. When the Illinois Association of School Boards sends out their legislative updates, they do have the bills broken down by different categories. The governor did have his budget address and people have been reacting to that. This is just a proposed budget and there is still time between now and May when the budget should be finalized.

#### 6. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT (Policy 3:40)

The Superintendent shared about advanced placement courses, which are part of the Strategic Plan. There has been consistent and strong growth in offerings and participation. This year was the highest pass rate yet. He also shared about collaborating with the Geneva Public Library to make sure that all Geneva students have a library card. This is still in the development stage and would require an Intergovernmental Agreement. He gave an update on institutional modernizations happening across the district. One that you have heard about is our student information system. Others include Enterprise Resource Planning, records digitization, and updating the board meeting live and recorded experience.
