


Four-Year Old Program (Submitted by: Ruth Shea)

Our unit in April was "Shadows and Reflections". We experimented with our shadows on the playground--seeing how big and how small we could make them. In Math, we learned about different shapes and looked for shapes in our environment. The assessment team came to administer the Dial 4. We are excited to report that at least 69% of our students are Kindergarten ready. The Easter egg hunt was exciting and fun for our children. We made Easter projects to take home. Our children took large paper eggs home to decorate with their family. We had lots of pretty eggs returned to school. We ended the month of April with our annual Art in the Park family activity which was well attended.


Kindergarten ISIP Reading Data (submitted by: Brandy Bremner)

We have made growth in Overall Reading since the September test, but have not seen significant tier change since "Walk to Read" started at the end of January. We are in the process of analyzing our data and processes to determine why we are experiencing this and what adjustments we can make.







Celebration!! We have decreased our Tier 3 students from 109 to 38 students since our September Letter Knowledge test! We have 61 students now scoring Tier 1 and 22 students who have tested out of the Letter Knowledge subtest!





We started the year with 55 students in Tier 3 in Phonemic awareness, and now have 57. We are looking at the impacts of "Walk to Read", attendance correlations, and instruction. One interesting conclusion that we have reached is, although there is no Tier growth...there is significant growth in scores as shown by the Skill Growth report (above, right), particularly with Tier 3 students. The average point growth for Tier 3 students was 23 points!






First Grade


First Grade ISIP Reading Data (Submitted by: Sandi Campbell)

The month of April surely disappeared quickly. The Aapaapaitsitapi Pokaiks (White Weasel Children) have been very busy throughout the month focusing solely on our Blackfeet traditional way of life and the use of our language. During the month of April our focus was on our "nitoyis" (tipi). We focused on the different meanings of the designs as well as creating our own using the representation of our class name, White Weasel and each individual student's Blackfoot name. We attended the tipi-making with Kevin Crawford and each student created their own tipi. Right now our main focus with the language is introducing a new word each week. We are still working on the Blackfoot words for money, penny, nickel, dime, quarter and dollar. For our behavior we are working on building our napioh tapiim (rainbow). Each student has their own napioh tapiim and each day as they give a compliment, share, use kind words, etc they can add a color. On Friday's if they have a complete napioh tapiim they can get into the class treasure box. This is a great form of working on and displaying respect for ourselves, our culture and our peers. We have started to create a book to take home at the end of the year with the months of the year, and days of the week as well as using our animals and plants to write complete sentences in Blackfoot.
