

House Bill 3409

Sponsored by Representatives BYNUM, KOTEK, SMITH WARNER; Representatives FAHEY, MCKEOWN, WILLIAMSON, Senator WAGNER

AN ACT

Relating to behavior related to interscholastic activities; amending ORS 332.075; and declaring an emergency.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. ORS 332.075 is amended to read:

332.075. (1) Any district school board may:

(a) Fix the days of the year and the hours of the day when schools shall be in session.

(b) Adopt textbooks and other instructional materials as provided in ORS 337.120 and 337.141 and courses of study for the use of such schools as provided in ORS 336.035.

(c) Authorize the use of the schools for purposes of training students of an approved educator preparation provider, as defined in ORS 342.120, and for such purposes may enter into contracts with the approved educator preparation provider on such terms as may be agreed upon. Such contracts as they relate to student teachers shall have the same effect and be subject to the same regulations as a contract between a licensed teacher and a district school board.


To create a safe, welcoming and validating environment in Oregon schools by specifically disrupting racism and combating discrimination, so EVERY student can thrive as they are.





S.T.A.R. IN ANSWER TO HB 3409



FOCUS OF HOUSE BILL 3409

- HB 3409:
 - (A) Implements policies that address the use of derogatory or inappropriate names, insults, verbal assaults, profanity or ridicule that occurs at an interscholastic activity, including by spectators of the interscholastic activity.
- OSAA and member schools are focused on finding ways to better the experience of all participants and spectators at OSAA sanctioned events.

S.T.A.R. SCHOOL PROGRAM

To meet the S.T.A.R. school standards set by the OSAA, a school must implement event management strategies with the intention of providing the safest and most welcoming environment to all who attend OSAA sanctioned events. If there is a discriminatory incident that occurs, the school must also have a plan prepared for how to both interrupt the behaviors that occur, as well as follow through with all who are involved.



S.T.A.R. SCHOOL PROGRAM

- Event Management
 - Signage
 - Pre-event communication
 - Monitor student sections
 - Interrupt acts of discriminatory harassment
 - Public address
- Modeling good sportsmanship
 - Requiring it of participants and fans

Every district in Oregon is required to adopt an <u>Every</u>
<u>Student Belongs</u> policy by state law, which applies to hate symbols and bias incidents that may occur at athletic events and school activities.

OREGON SCHOOL BOARD ASSOCIATION

- Every school board is required to adopt written policies which assure equity, opportunity and access for all students in each school and program as provided in OAR 581-021-0045 and 581-021-0046.
