PSC offers an array of services to assist municipalities, counties, and state agencies with assessing, expending, and reporting on ARPA funding.

- **Funding Eligibility**. Understanding where funds can be spent is a critical first step in the ARPA process. PSC can help distill the complicated federal regulations and guidance to determine allowable expenses. While ARPA's focus is to address short- and long-term impacts of the public health emergency, it does provide flexibility in determining the unique impacts in each community.
- Strategic Direction. After understanding what types of projects ARPA funds can be spent on, the next critical step is determining where to spend those funds. PSC can assist by facilitating strategy sessions with staff and elected leadership to determine high-priority needs and develop a course of action. This process should integrate existing plans and strategies to serve as a starting point for discussion and prioritization.
- Stakeholder Engagement. Integrating the input of residents on spending priorities can help staff and elected officials in their decision process. PSC can facilitate public input sessions, in person or virtually, and garner additional feedback via surveys, websites, and social media. Most importantly, PSC can structure stakeholder engagement to ensure participants are aware of the funding's intent and limitations.
- **Reporting and Compliance**. Once it has been determined where money will be spent, it is critical to ensure expenditures meet federal requirements. PSC can help navigate the regulations and assist with compliance reporting. If necessary, the PSC team would coordinate its efforts with the County's accounting firm to ensure compliance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board requirements.
- Leveraging Additional Resources. Direct ARPA funding to Michigan counties exceeds \$1.9 billion and the State of Michigan another \$6.5 billion. However, some federal agencies have received ARPA funding and will distribute those funds to local governments through a variety of programs, including competitive grant applications. For example, the U.S. Economic Development Administration has received \$3 billion for economic development projects—nine times its average annual investment. PSC is tracking these opportunities and can assist with identifying, applying for, and securing additional funds.

PSC can provide any of these services on a stand-alone basis or in combination to provide a comprehensive support system. PSC works closely with organizations to assess the needs and reach consensus on the necessary scope of work before proceeding.

Prior Experience

Public Sector Consultants has extensive experience supporting governmental agencies in securing and expending state and federal funding. PSC's recent and ongoing work in this space has focused on efforts related to the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act. PSC is working directly with local governments and through the Michigan Municipal League (MML). Specific projects include:

- **City of Flint**: PSC has been working with the City of Flint since April 2020 to provide support for a variety of CARES Act funding, both as a direct recipient of federal funding and through the State of Michigan. PSC has helped Flint secure nearly \$1.8 million.
- City of Lansing: The City of Lansing hired PSC in December 2020 to be their Economic Resource
 and Recovery Developer—identifying and pursuing both philanthropic and governmental funding to
 support pandemic recovery in the city. PSC has been meeting with community partners, developing
 priorities, and generating funding proposals.
- Macomb County: PSC completed a project in December 2020 with Macomb Community Action (MCA) to do a community needs assessment to meet federal requirements and establish a framework for assessing the needs of older adults, youth, and families with low income. While this project did not involve pursuing funding, it leveraged data and stakeholder engagement to identify key focus areas for future work—a critical foundation for pursuing available funding.
- Michigan Municipal League: PSC has provided support to MML since May 2020 for
 operationalizing the <u>ServeMICity</u> program. Providing technical assistance to 56 cities, villages, and
 counties through this program, PSC has helped communities secure over \$30 million in funding to
 date. PSC has also supported MML with the execution of the Pure Michigan Small Business Relief
 Initiative, an effort that awarded \$10 million to nearly 700 small businesses across Michigan.

These projects provide PSC with a clear understanding of the challenges faced by local governments in the federal and state funding process, as well as solutions to those challenges. During these projects, the firm provided support and assistance for the following programs:

PSC's success in supporting state and federal funding requests is based on the ability to execute on three key factors: project management, grant administration, and compliance and reporting. These skill sets are at the core of PSC's efforts in these endeavors and carry over to all ARPA projects.

Project Management

At the heart of PSC's work is a dedicated, responsive approach to project management. Our project management services are tailored to meet client objectives through the development and execution of

detailed workplans as well as collaboration and coordination among partners and stakeholders to ensure the timely completion of deliverables. PSC project managers maintain budgets, collect data, coordinate with stakeholders, provide concise status updates, and work closely with clients to develop processes and systems to ensure efficient and effective resource deployment. Stakeholder coordination can also expand into public engagement, helping to facilitate input and ensure adequate transparency. Project managers regularly use online scheduling and virtual meeting platforms to coordinate stakeholder communications and support greater collaboration in decision making.

For example, PSC provided extensive project management services to the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) for five years as the agency implemented the federally funded State Innovation Model. The firm facilitated leadership team meetings and workgroups, coordinated logistics and communication with key stakeholders (e.g., bureau directors and legislators), and worked closely with MDHHS staff to develop processes for transforming healthcare delivery and financing in the state.

Grant Administration

PSC has extensive grant management experience, overseeing multiple grant projects for the <u>Great Lakes Fishery Trust (GLFT)</u> and the <u>Greater Ann Arbor Region's (GAAR's) Prosperity Initiative</u>. The firm has provided a full range of management services for the GLFT since its inception in 1996, serving as staff to the board and handling all operational aspects of the organization. The GLFT Board of Directors and Scientific Advisory Team comprise representatives from federal and state government, energy companies, conservation clubs, and Native American tribes. PSC has managed issuance of more than \$80 million in grants, approximately 50 grants annually, performing all aspects of grant management activities from inception to final closeout. PSC developed a customized Web-based grant management system to support grant administration and augment rigorous internal controls to ensure compliance with GLFT policies.

As part of the GAAR Prosperity Initiative, PSC provided program administration and management services from 2014 to 2020, working closely with project partners to expand economic prosperity and quality of life in Hillsdale, Jackson, Lenawee, Livingston, Monroe, and Washtenaw Counties. PSC provided multiple management support activities, including oversight of the challenge grant process, which sought innovative approaches and measurable progress toward the Five-year Prosperity Strategy. PSC also coordinated a quarterly progress report process with grant recipients, reviewing grantee invoices to ensure consistency with approved project budgets.

Compliance and Reporting Systems

PSC has developed and implemented multiple data and reporting systems for both broader initiatives and specialized standalone projects. The firm has extensive expertise with leveraging technology to coordinate and execute reporting deliverables for complex projects. This includes grant compliance reporting using Web-based tools to track progress against deadlines and deliverables and to coordinate with grantees.

For 15 years, PSC has led the development and operation of the Michigan Department of Education Office of Special Education's (OSE's) regulatory compliance tool—<u>Catamaran</u>. Catamaran is a Web-based platform for compliance management that provides data collection, enables two-way workflow, and facilitates communication between professionals in the field and the OSE. Catamaran simplifies regulatory work for the OSE and its external partners across 56 intermediate school districts and approximately 900 of their member districts, improving process efficiency and supporting timely collection, analysis, and reporting of regulatory data. PSC has provided strategic counsel, project management, and tiered support to the OSE since the tool's inception, ensuring the state's compliance with complex federal program requirements.
