

Overall attendance held steady for the month of April.


Highlights and Activities

- 1. <u>ATLAS Summative Assessment:</u> ASBVI administered the ATLAS summative assessment to students at the start of the testing window, April 14. **Mrs. Lori Cole and Mr. Dakota Dalton** worked through all the accommodations with our staff to ensure that the testing was accessible for all of our students. The flexibility of this team in working through issues cannot be over emphasized. Each time there was a problem, the team connected with the DESE Student Assessment office and found a solution. Notably, a DESE testing monitor visited on the final day of scheduled testing to inspect our testing procedures and issued a clean report. Great job to our team!
- 2. <u>ASBVI Prom:</u> On Wednesday, April 23, ASBVI held its annual Prom at the Burns Park Hospitality House in North Little Rock, bringing the glamour and intrigue of the Roaring Twenties to life. With a Prohibition-era theme, the event featured elegant decorations, delicious food, and lively music that kept everyone dancing throughout the evening. A highlight of the night was an interactive murder mystery performance, which captivated guests and showcased the dramatic

Designed specifically for blind and deaf students from across the state, this unique event offered inclusive and accessible ways to experience art while also introducing students to potential career opportunities within the museum and broader art world. Students in grades 10 through 12 from both ASBVI and ASD participated in the free event, which has been nearly a year in the making. Through hands-on activities, guided explorations, and curated exhibits, students engaged with art on their own terms—through touch, sound, and other sensory-rich experiences.

Following the museum visit, the group traveled to **Camp War Eagle** where they spent the night in preparation for another major opportunity the next day—a guided tour of the **University of Arkansas** campus in Fayetteville on



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Wednesday, April 24. This tour gave students a firsthand look at college life and allowed them to explore potential pathways for their future education.

The collaboration and hospitality extended by Crystal Bridges, Camp War Eagle, and the University of Arkansas were exceptional. All three institutions expressed their appreciation for the students' respectful behavior, curiosity, and engagement—and each extended open invitations for future visits. Human Capital Updates

ASBVI has made great strides at recruiting qualified staff to fill our open vacancies. Our principals and program supervisors have done a fantastic job interviewing and making recommendations. The ADE Human Resources team is working on the onboarding process with those individuals and we are expecting to have teacher positions filled for start to the Fall 2025 and our ancillary staff vacancies filled very soon.

ASBVI is presently looking to hiring staff for the upcoming school year in addition to some other. The following positions are currently open and advertised:

- Teacher–Special Education (one candidate is filled; looking for one more)
- Teacher–Elementary—will be filled for the 2025-2026 school year
- Nurse—Registered Nurse (1) and LPN (2)—for immediate hire
- Residential Advisors (2)—had four vacancies and have recommended two for onboarding. Looking for two more to be filled for immediate hire
- Residential Activities Supervisor—position posted and currently interviewing for immediate hire

Building Project Updates



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While the academic year is coming to a close, progress on the new building project continues at a steady pace. The former structures on the construction site have been fully demolished, and groundwork is now underway. Architects from SCM and MMA have been working closely with internal stakeholder groups to finalize key aspects of the building's layout. They will also provide a community project reveal scheduled for May 22 in Parnell Hall, between ASBVI and ASD graduation ceremonies, where family and community stakeholders will be invited to preview the design features of the new facility.

In related news, Kevin Lentz and the architectural teams from SCM and MMA will be meeting with the Arkansas Natural and Cultural Resources Council (ANCRC) on May 21 to present a grant proposal for capital improvements to Parnell Hall, which is being incorporated into the broader building project. ASBVI and ASD are hopeful for a positive outcome, as ANCRC has previously supported enhancements tied to historical and cultural preservation on campus.

Looking ahead, major topographical changes to the construction site are expected over the summer. Nabholz Construction, in coordination with subcontractors and engineers, will be reshaping the terrain to create a more level building site—an essential step before foundation work can begin.
