

Homeless Assistance Program (HAP)

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act defines "homeless children and youths" as "individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate residence."

The ECISD HAP Program assists these students by removing obstacles and providing families with resources needed to support their education and close the achievement gap.

Students are identified as homeless if they are living in:

- a shelter
- a house or apartment with more than one family because of economic hardship or loss
- an abandoned building, car, camper, campground or on the street
- temporary foster care
- substandard housing (no electricity, water or heat), or
- with friends or family because they are a runaway or unaccompanied youth.



Homeless Assistance Program (HAP)

Services provided:

- Tutoring for secondary homeless students who may not graduate without additional assistance
- EL (English Learner)/Homeless Grad lab
- Enrollment assistance
- Applying for free lunch program
- Arranging transportationSchool supplies and uniforms
- Referrals to social services and housing
- Information regarding the rights of homeless students
- Teachers are notified at each grading cycle of who the homeless students are in their specific class periods
- Teachers are given general tips on how to help homeless students

Dropout Recovery Grad Lab

First Grad Lab Graduate

- Offers flexible scheduling and smaller environment
- Started by recovering homeless students and Limited English Proficiency students who have dropped out.
- The students are enrolled at their home campus but attend full time at the COC. (49 students currently attend full time – 28 Homeless and 21 LEP)

Teen Parent Related Services (TPRS)

TPRS Goal: Removing any obstacles to ensure students have the opportunity to graduate. Current serving 148 students.

(102 Economically Disadvantaged including 79 Hispanic, 10 African American)

Staff and Services include:

- Support Staff at each high school:
 - Counselor, caseworker, teen parent specialist, and homebound teacher when needed
- Services:
 - Transportation to:
 - School, Child Care Facility, Health services and Community Service Agencies
 - Fathers' support services (48 in 2015-16)
 - Senior Celebration
 - Family Support including previously served parents (168 in 2015-16)

The average number of pregnancies utilizing TPRS services over the last 4 years is 116







TPRS and the Community

First 5 Permian Basin - A division of the UTPB College of Education Provides a free fatherhood engagement program that offers one on one and group education for fathers.

Nurse-Family Partnership - Offers FREE pregnancy and infant care education for first time moms.

Holds a health fair in the fall at UTPB.

Parents as Teachers

Free home visiting program that teaches safety and educates parents during pregnancy and up to 5 years after the baby is born.







Coca Cola Valued Youth Programs

- Cross-age program available to at-risk high school students
- Students have the opportunity to:
 - Provide mentoring and tutoring to elementary students
 - Receive pay for their work
- Currently offered to Odessa High School students
- Elementary campuses served:
 - Sam Houston
 - San Jacinto
- Yearly planning/review to add additional campuses



Instructional supports to close the performance gap

- Campus Curriculum Facilitators (CCF) at each campus support teachers in curriculum and instruction, discipline, and organization
- Balanced Literacy strategies implemented by Reading Specialists' at elementary campuses in grades K-5
- Balanced Literacy support continues in grades 6 and 7 with assistance from the campus CCFs
- Guided Math Framework and TEKS-based strategies provided by CCF's in grades K-5

- Improvement Required (IR) campuses are supported by the core area coordinators weekly
- LTS Stride software program used for Tier 2 intervention in Math, Reading and Science for grades K-8; content area specific for grades 9-12
- Dyslexia teachers provide services to identified students
- Reading Coaches provide support to 5 assigned schools
