Documentation for Charter Amendment Requests

Rationale: We are requesting to change the grade configuration at Friendship Aspire North Little Rock Elementary from K-5 to K-3 beginning the 2024-2025 school year. Students currently in grades 3-5 at our North Little Rock campus will be bused to our Friendship Aspire Little Rock Elementary (4th and 5th graders) and Friendship Aspire Little Rock Middle Schools (6th graders).

The enrollment at Friendship Aspire North Little Rock Elementary is on a steady increase in the early grades. Friendship Aspire North Little Rock Elementary is currently situated on a floodplain. As a result, there is no allowable space to expand. The campus has run out of space to house additional scholars. The approval of the amendment would allow current 3rd, 4th, and 5th graders to continue receiving high-quality instruction in the Friendship Aspire Academy Network. We would therefore like to turn Friendship Aspire North Little Rock into an Early Learning Center serving grades K through 3.

Friendship Aspire North Little Rock Elementary is located in a high poverty neighborhood. The benefits of offering an Early Learning Center in that neighborhood would be life-changing for the families.
