AC. Houghton Elementary **Community Involvement at ACH**

At AC Houghton, community involvement has been pretty good through the years. Events such as classroom celebrations special days or holidays always have good parent participation. Each grade level takes an educational field trip each year. We always have parent volunteers going along as volunteer assistants and chaperones. Our school has always been a part of the Foster Grandparent Program. This is a program where senior citizen members of the community are in the school each day during a majority of the day providing assistance in reading and/or language arts areas to students in several specific classes. They serve as great role models for students and are of great assistance to our instructional program. Our school has also had a continued participation by former parents, now patrons, because they don't have ACH students of their own, helping out in classes and in the production of instructional materials. Another positive area of community involvement comes from Irrigon High School students that serve as instructional assistants in classrooms as regular a signed class. This provides help and mentoring for our students and also positive role modeling. Our student involvement in the community is focused on two big areas. The first is our annual community cleanup day in April. Almost every student and staff member in the school picks up trash covering a 20 square block area of downtown Irrigon. That usually amounts to a couple dumpsters full of paper and other trash. The final area is set. We have become a high level of recycling school. We recycle all white paper, plastic, metal, and we wash our lunch dishes instead of using throwaway dishes. We want to be as Green as possible. We have a group of third graders that are our Recycle Team that collects white paper on a weekly basis. We also are the recycling source of white paper from the other schools.

Child Find

This was before March, but we wanted the Board to know of this activity from our school. On February 26, 2010 the Principal and Specialists at A.C. Houghton participated in "Child Find" hosted by the Umatilla Morrow Educational Service District. Approximately 60 children were screened for potential learning and development problems. Many of these children will be able to attend the ESD's early educational programs along with getting assistance on speech, language and developmental problems. This was a huge success. In the past, Child Find has only been reaching approximately 10 to 20 children a year at this screening. Due to more advertisement, letters home to parents of children at A.C. Houghton, personal phone calls and home visits, more children were screened. Lunch was also served to the parents and children that participated. This also contributed to the success of the day.

Heppner Elementary School

It is once again a privilege to report the recent happenings of Heppner Elementary School. April has arrived and our enrollment at HES is 195 students as of today. Our current attendance percentage for the 2009/2010 school year is 94.83%. We still have 14 students in the running for perfect attendance for the year. As always we will continue to promote the importance of regular attendance to the students and parents of Heppner Elementary School.

March was full of many exciting events which took place at HES, with the highlight being the “Hawaiian Dance/Luau Party” that was held on March 18th, sponsored by the HES Parent Teacher Club. This family event was a great success and I would like to say **Thank You** to all who were involved with this spectacular fun filled evening. I have received many positive remarks from the families who attended and it appeared that everyone really enjoyed spending family time together. The HES Chess Mates Club also celebrated their final day on March 8th and fun was had by all who attended.

The third quarter ended on March 18th and we held conferences at HES on April 1st and 2nd. The Honor Card Assembly for the third quarter will be held in the HES gym at 2:00pm on Wednesday, April 7th. Other noteworthy events for the month of April include the Writing Festival for 5th and 6th graders at WRE on April 15th, and the MCSD Math Contest being held at HES on the evening of April 22nd.

With the second round of OAKS testing complete, HES is again showing positive RIT growth and good results on the OAKS Tests.

I would like to end this months report by again thanking each of you for your support of Heppner Elementary School, and for your commitment to all students of the Morrow County School District.

Heppner High School

- We just finished our second round of OAKS testing and we are excited about the numbers we are seeing in several areas. With one more testing window to go, we could gain several more meets from students that are on the bubble. But in a nutshell, looking at just meet and exceeds- we like where we are sitting at this point. Here are our percentages 7th grade math 86%- 22/26 students met or exceeded, 7th grade reading 77%- 20/26 students met or exceeded with several nearly meeting the standard, 8th grade math 83%- 24/29 students met or exceeded, 8th grade reading 70%- 20/29 students met or exceeded with seven of these students nearly meeting the standard, 10th grade math 82%- 27/33 students met or exceeded, and 10 grade reading 85%- 28/33 of our 10th grade students have met or exceeded. We are continually working on getting all of our students over the hump and will have some tremendous growth in some of our kids that have not met due to how low they were at the start of the year. Congrats to my staff and their work here!
- Our seniors have been working very hard on scholarships. This class is extremely talented with several of them being accepted to honors colleges and hard to get into private universities. This process is exciting for students, staff and parents. It definitely demonstrates the “good” that Heppner High School illustrates through our students success.
- Congratulations to our FFA Program for their spring time accomplishments. 3 Heppner FFA members won their Proficiency area at the state level and their applications will advance now to the national level. Devin Robinson of Heppner was named the State Beef Production Placement award winner, Brynna Rust of Echo was named the State FFA Grain Production Placement award winner, and Garrett Gibbs of Heppner was named the State FFA Environmental Science and Natural Resources Placement award winner. All state winners receive a check of \$50 from the State FFA Association and \$250 from the National FFA. Their

applications will be judged and rated gold, silver or bronze. If chosen as one of the Top 4 National finalists each will receive a plaque and a \$500 check. The national winner, selected from this group, will receive an additional \$500 check and a plaque. The ESNR Proficiency area is sponsored by Triscuit, the Beef Production area is sponsored by Midwest PMS and National FFA Foundation and the Grain Production area is sponsored by Pioneer Hi-Bred.

- State FFA Degree Recipients from Heppner include: Brett Harrison, Kellee Jones, Jarreid Miller, Haley Struckmeier, Brynna Rust, Devin Robinson, Willy Gentry and Brandi Hong.
- Congratulations to the Heppner FFA Chapter for receiving 3rd place at state in BOTH Secretary's Book (Kelsi Putman) and Scrapbook!!!
- Again, these results are amazing and a testament of our Mrs. Dickenson's hard work and dedication to student success!

- FBLA State Convention is on April 7th through the 9th in Portland. We have two students attending with Mrs. Collins their advisor. Ashley Wolff and Daisy Victorio both qualified to compete on the state level in Business Ethics and Management Making Decisions. Irrigon Elementary School

1. Trevor Fox: Last month on March 4th a sixth grade student from IES was killed in a tragic motorcycle accident. Trevor Fox will be greatly missed. The day after his death we met with the Crisis Intervention Flight Team manager, and we prepared for the next Monday when children would return to school. That same Friday people held a candle vigil and walked from ACH to IES. About a 1,000 people came; it was amazing! On Monday, the office and the Crisis room were filled with students, parents and volunteer staff from other schools. The week before many of them had been helping at our schools in Heppner. We made it through the week with many tears, hugs and sighs. That Friday we held the final funeral service at IES gymnasium with about 800 in attendance. We will never be the same, but we are healing. I thank the Morrow County staff for all their help at this time of grief and pain. Together as a community, and as a district, we are thankful that we have each other and the wonderful supports of our ESD's Crisis Intervention Flight Team.
2. Battle of the Books: On March 18 the final battle of the last two teams battled for the questions being answered. The Kongregates beat the Book Worms by one question. Both teams won passes to the movies, bowling and to McDonalds or Pizza Hut. Over seventy students participated in the battling groups. This encourages kids to read, have fun, and win things for their efforts.
3. Third Quarter Awards Assembly: We celebrated our third quarter assembly with awards for AR reading, Gatoraid awards for P.E., teacher awards for students in each class, special programs awards, and perfect attendance awards. Parents were invited to attend to support their child receiving awards.

English Second Language (ESL)

1. The ESL director attended a Title II Staff Development seminar on March to have input and involvement in the staff development program to the whole district which impacts ELL students across the district. He joined the "Big Team" which works under the Assistant Superintendent Phyllis Danielson who is leading the direction of this team.
2. English Language Development Plan: The English Language Development plan has been developed to provide a structure for teachers across the district in both primary and secondary schools. This plan, sent to the Oregon Department of Education, will provide

a process by which the district plans to prepare every teacher to better teach their content and English language development.

3. ELPA (English Language Proficiency Assessment) test: The district has completed the ELPA test for every ESL student in the district. This test is required by state law for every ELL student in our district ESL program. It is done every year. By this test we are able to identify how many students have increased English proficiency levels and how many students are exiting the ESL program. Any new ESL student will be quickly assessed in the ELPA until May 17th, which is the last day we can use this test.

Irrigon High School

We have just finished ELPA testing for our ELL students, and we have finished analyzing our second round of OAKS scores. We will soon begin the new online version of the state writing test for our 10th grade students, and any 11th and 12th grade students who have not yet passed. In addition to a score from a trained rater, the system will generate a score as well. Once the writing tests are finished, we will conduct our last round of OAKS testing.

In 8th and 10th grade, we are already outperforming the results we posted at the end of the second round of testing last year. In the 7th grade, we are 9 students away from surpassing last year's performance in both Reading and Math. In 8th grade, we are 1 student away in Reading, 3 students in Math, and we have already topped last year's best performance in Science. In 10th grade, we are 2 students away from surpassing our best performance last year in Reading, 5 students away in Science, and we have already topped our performance in 10th grade Math.

In addition, we are closely monitoring the students who, if they meet benchmark, will help us make AYP. Since the AYP targets increased by 10% this year, we are working even harder to help those students meet. We have already demonstrated incredible growth (8 points average for 9 of the 11 7th graders) for students "double dipped" in Math. Because many of those students have tested out of the additional math class, we have moved a number of students in that we have identified as needing additional help.

Over spring break Morrow County FFA attended the state convention in Corvallis. After placing first in the regional event, our beginning parli-pro team took fourth at state. When not competing, students attended workshops, sessions, elected officers, and selected proficiency winners.

Our Knights Pride Booster Club's annual auction was held last month and was an enormous success. Their efforts raised over \$15,000 dollars to devote to various projects and programs around our school, including a \$1000 donation to our library last week. Of that \$15000, we had ten student groups earn a combined \$1410 from table sponsorships including the Key Club who brought in a whopping \$575 for their table.

4th Grade Parent Party

Science and Engineering was the focus of our March parent party. Using string, balloons, a straw, and a cargo carrier made out of a milk carton, students designed and tested a rocket balloon. The cargo was 10 paper clips. The goal was to find the best design that would carry the cargo the furthest. Students found that the larger the balloon (more air), the further their rocket traveled in distance. Some other changes that were tried were different kinds of strings, where slick fishing line created the least amount of friction, making the rocket travel further. It was an excellent experience that provided the students and parents with practice in Designing and Engineering, a new component of the new Science standards.

Benchmark Testing Rewards

On April 1st, as a reward for students who either passed Math or made a 6+ point gain, WRE had an extra recess at 2:20-2:50pm. All those who passed Reading or made a 6+ point gain went to a 2:50-3:20pm extra recess. IF they qualify for both, then they had a one-hour recess. This turned out to be a great motivation for students and was a great success.

WRE Family Math Night

Family Math Night at Windy River Elementary, held on March 11th, was a success. The evening started with a free hamburger/chips/pop dinner for the first 100 people to attend. All but a few of the burgers were devoured. Students and their parents/guardians then stopped by tables all employing math skills: Straw Rockets and Statistics/Probability; Probability and Statistics Games; Checkbook Writing and Reconciliation; Tangrams; Estimation; and Graphing, to name a few. Games involving math concepts were given out by each table as prizes throughout the evening including Monopoly, Phase 10 and Chess. Teachers are excited to do this again next year with plans on how to make it even better.

OMSI Assembly

On Monday, March 8th, OMSI came to our school for an assembly and presented science circus: the physics of fun. Juggling, acrobatics and the irresistible force of levity demonstrating the significance and relevance of physics.
