### **December Board Meeting**










# Mini Bank Board Meeting--Submitted by Matt Harrington



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## **Instructional Coaches: Submitted by Mrs. Wagner**

November was a very busy month for the Instructional Coaches at Napi Elementary! We hosted our mathematics instructional consultant Mary Buck on Wednesday, November 2. We readjusted the pacing guides for both grade levels to include modified instructional modules with the intention of focusing on concepts that are considered critical for moving students into the next grade level. We also focused on creating an instructional flowchart for math instruction. Math instruction will focus on whole group instruction first before moving into small group instruction with a focus on slowing the pace. In small group instruction, teachers will focus on teaching foundational skills to students who demonstrate gaps in their learning. We will begin focusing on fluency building using the Aimsweb fluency tool and assess bi-monthly for T3 students and quarterly for T2 and T1 students.

Mrs. Bragg and Mrs. Wagner both attended the monthly instructional coaches meeting and the monthly Ellevation meeting hosted by Browning Elementary. The coaches shared information about the seven principles of teams for building partnerships. Once shared and discussed, each member of the principal and coaching team participated in taking the survey created to serve as a baseline data tool. We will revisit this information at a later date. We also assisted and participated in the kickoff activities for our Kindness project at Napi Elementary.

The fourth grade team hosted the monthly Family Literacy night on November 17 and helped distribute free books to all who came and participated.

Professional development was provided to staff on creating and using focus folders for small group instruction in ELA. The coaches assisted teachers in finding appropriate lessons in phonics to work with A1 and A2 groups created based off of fall Aimsweb benchmark data in each classroom.

The coaches will continue to work with assisting staff enter notes into Ellevation, piloting the Branching Minds data system, and continued professional development using the Aimsweb platforms.

Both coaches are currently working with grade level teams in supporting ELA, Math, and general instructional support. Mrs. Wagner currently has 6 active coaching cycles within the 4th grade team while Mrs. Bragg currently is working with \_\_\_\_ active cycles with the 5th grade team.

# **Spookanapi--Submitted by Mrs. Wells**

During the month of November, Spookinaapi took a break from the Too Good Curriculum to focus on Kindness. Over the last few weeks, we discussed what it means to deliver random acts of kindness and to notice the positivity that surrounds us each day. When delivering and receiving acts of kindness we hope to increase our happiness, reduce stress, and improve emotional wellbeing. Students made cards and delivered them to students and staff in the building. Students also made signs to thank responders and people of the community. Spreading kindness offers us the opportunity to connect with others, improve social interaction, increase a sense of belonging, and overall a stronger community.















#### **Counselor Center--Mr. Andreas**

During November, all students in grades 4 and 5 received social emotional instruction using the Second Step Curriculum on the topic of kindness and empathy. Empathy, feeling or understanding what someone else is feeling, is a key competency for students at this age and allows them to develop other skills to interact with students, friends and family. The Second Step Social Emotional Curriculum is used throughout the school year as part of the specials rotation and students will learn problem solving skills and emotional management skills later on this school year. In addition to the Second Step Instruction, identified Tier 3 students receive both daily Check and Connect services and Dessa Small Group Instruction to build social emotional skills if they are struggling.

The Napi Counseling Center has also been busy providing supportive services to students who need them to be academically successful. These services include; coats, hats and gloves as needed, access to showers and hygiene products, weekend food program, referrals to IHS Behavioral Health, special services screening/assessment services, home visits and family support, 504 medical plans and accommodations, emergency transportation, conflict mediation and crisis counseling as needed. It is my vision to assist guardians and students in eliminating the barriers to academic success so that students can become successful.
