CHILDREN ARE OUR FUTURE

In scenes reminiscent of sweepstakes prize patrols, the Aledo ISD Education Foundation made the rounds of all campuses Tuesday, laden with good news and grant checks for teachers. There were even a marching band and cheerleaders. The foundation, formed in the past year to support AISD teaching efforts, had raised more than \$90,000 and split that money among 38 grant requests.

The prize posse made awards ranging from \$650 to \$5,000 to individual or groups of teachers. Project names ranged from an outdoor classroom at Coder Elementary to theatrical lighting at the high school and a cultural extravaganza at the ninth grade center. Names ranged from a simple "Robotics" at McAnally to "Inquiry and Technology Based Probeware for Laboratory Investigations" at AHS.

"I felt like I was 8 years-old again, and Santa Claus just kept bringing more gifts!" foundation board member Kevin Wright said. Foundation President Shawn Callaway said that it was a great day and fantastic to see the excitement in the faces of the teachers and the students, and to see the creative and innovative educational opportunities come into play in the district.

Although the grant applications were judged blindly, each campus wound up with several awards. "It worked out perfect," Callaway said. "We couldn't have planned it any better." Emotions ranged from jumping up and down and hugging to a few tears, he said. One teacher told Callaway that the grant helped validate her work as a teacher, and helped her realize she was on track.

Callaway noted that the foundation wrote one check to the district, and the items will be bought and tracked through district purchase orders, and the equipment will belong to the district. As part of the grant process, teachers were asked how they will track and quantify the results.

"It's important for the foundation to be able to go back to the donors and show their money was spent wisely," Callaway said. "The grants will also show some creative ideas that could be implemented throughout the district," he added. For example, a group of third grade teachers at Vandagriff Elementary requested funds for yoga balls, which research has shown can help students with ADD and ADHD. The high school students participating started asking when they could get them.

Between the efforts of the foundation and the Parent Teacher Organization, which recently donated \$60,000 to the district, Callaway said as many needs as possible can be met. "It was a rewarding day," he said, adding that he was told by several business people that they couldn't remember such a rewarding event.

The Aledo Education Foundation granted first year agriculture teacher Dave Marcath \$4,500 to buy hog pens for the high school ag barn, but he said that it's not about hog pens.

"The least important part of this is the animal. It's about the responsibility (the students) gain, the work ethic, the business sense, the knowledge," said Marcath.

The grant allowed Marcath to secure 26 hog pens that were installed in February, and animals were brought in almost immediately. Many of the pens, which house goats and lambs in addition to hogs, house two animals. Prior to the pen installation, only six animals were housed at the ag facility.

Marcath estimated three-fourths of his students live in suburban homes, which does not allow them the opportunity to raise an animal. With the success of the pens, Aledo had 69 entries in the Parker County junior livestock show in June as compared to 13 a year ago.

Animal projects may help a student find a place who has not fit in with other groups.

"It brings kids out of their shell," he said, pointing to several examples of students who were once quiet and shy and have risen to leadership positions in the Aledo FFA chapter. "None of that would be possible without the support of the foundation, the school board and the community," he added.

Heather Stark knows all about self-esteem issues facing young girls. The Stuard Elementary School counselor suffered an eating disorder when she was just a fifth grader. So when the Aledo Education Foundation offered the opportunity to seek grants to enhance the educational experience of Aledo students, Stark knew what she wanted to do.

"It's something I'm incredibly passionate about," Stark said. "I feel like it was something placed in my heart by God as a mission." The \$863 grant allowed Stark to purchase materials to go along with a program developed by the Dove company to help girls build better self-esteem.

"It's a battle to fight the way that women are portrayed in films and television," she said. Stark has been a counselor for seven years and had set up meetings with girls during the lunch period to try to address the problem. However, she wanted to develop a full afterschool program with a curriculum, and the grant allowed that to happen.

"This is a need that needs to be met," she said. Stark explained that girls' identities begin to take shape in about the fifth grade, so she initially designed the program, "Gracefully Strong," for fifth grade girls. She was encouraged by a member of the education foundation to expand it to fourth grade and was awarded additional grant funds to make that happen.

The eight-week program was offered on a voluntary basis with approximately 40 girls

expressing an interest. Generally 20 to 25 were in attendance, which Stark considered a good start. She would like to see the program expanded and offered to students from all four Aledo elementary schools.

The curriculum stresses hands-on activities. Stark explained that girls see on TV and hear the messages about self-esteem, but they need something they can put their hands on. One such activity involves using a Styrofoam head (the type used for wigs) to demonstrate what a strong girl looks like. They studied Norman Rockwell paintings of women to see how they are portrayed.

Some of the girls favored a traditional look while others went more modern, with different hair colors and styles. "They've got to be able to touch it and say it out loud," Stark said of the lessons. They learn what it means being a girl, being healthy, and being a strong girl.

Another part of the program is bringing in successful female role models, to teach the

girls how to communicate, set goals, and be confident. At the end of the program, Stark held a come-and-go session at the school on a Saturday, inviting the girls and their mothers to take part in activities.

The community has embraced and supported the program. Stark was asked to speak about the program's benefits at the recent education foundation banquet. From those remarks came an invitation to Fort Worth Mayor Betsy Price to come to the school and speak to the girls. Price addressed the girls on Wednesday, May 28.

Stark said it is important for the girls to see and hear a strong, confident woman such as Mayor Price, who leads one of the largest cities in the state and the nation. "She is the essence of a gracefully strong woman," Stark said. "She has got to have a lot of goals set and a lot of confidence to attack those goals." Price spent time answering numerous questions from the girls and giving them insight on how she came to such a prominent position.




