Matthew Warren (English Dept.)

In 2023, students in one of the English department's book publishing courses selected the poem "Looking for America," written by Steve Deutsch, to be included in that year's volume of the Clackamas Literary Review (CLR). Meanwhile, a professional composer, Martin Rokeach, was commissioned by conductor Bruce Koliha to write a piece for chorus, to be performed by the San Ramon Valley Chorale.

After reading more than 200 poems, Marty came across Steve's poem in the Clackamas Literary Review and sought permission to set the work to music. The choir work premiered in April 2025, nearly two years after the poem was first published in the CLR, and recently won Sacramento State's Festival of New American Music in the choir category, a national music prize for a piece of music that only existed because a poet wrote a poem, and because students at CCC taking a book publishing class selected it for publication in our award-winning and internationally-read literary journal.

Dave Badstubner (Music Technology)

Wanted to let you know that the Music Department installed a new, large-format analog recording console for the recording studio at the Oregon City campus. We started the official installation proceedings on August 7th, and we finished the installation and commissioned the console on September 23rd. Please feel free to stop by our facility at Niemeyer. I would love to give you a tour and introduce you to an exciting new development for our community. They would also like to thank Ron Prince, Delbert Dulley and his crew, Elizabeth Cole, and Jeff Shaffer for their help in the coordination of the delivery.

This was right in line with the ideal schedule to allow for the console and the recording studio to facilitate our classes for our students this Fall Term. This new technology allows our institution to be the penultimate regional facility and focal point in the art and craft of audio recording. CCC now has one of the best outfitted recording studios, located in a community-focused and wholly accessible facility. Many reasons encompass why we chose to make this installation happen:

 We needed an industry-verified centerpiece of audio technology so that students can move forward through our program and be able to anticipate and interface with real industry demand.

- We will have to absorb the influx that will be ever-present from the closure of PCC's Sonic Arts program. CCC is now the forefront for audio education in a CTE paradigm for our region.
- Our students deserve the best technology afforded to them. When our students learn how to operate and interface with this new technology, we become stronger as an institution and prepare our students better for future career exploration.

This new centerpiece of technology will bolster the new AAS in Music Technology that was developed last year. All at an affordable cost and access point for our community at large.
