## XI. STUDENT PUBLICATIONS MEDIA

This Policy recognizes that:

- 1. Students may exercise their right of expression guaranteed by the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States; and
- 2. Truth, fairness, accuracy, and responsibility are essential to the practice of journalism.

As used in this Policy, "Student Media" is any means of communication that are (1) prepared, substantially written, published, or broadcasted by a student; (2) distributed or generally made available, either free of charge or for a fee, to members of the student body; and (3) prepared under the direction of a student media advisor. Student Media does not include media that is intended for distribution or transmission solely in the classroom in which it is produced.

As used in this Policy, "Student Media Advisor" is an individual who is employed, appointed, or designated by the District to supervise or provide instruction with respect to Student Media.

All <u>publications\_Student Media</u> that are supported financially by the school or by use of school facilities, or are produced in conjunction with a class shall be considered school-sponsored <u>publications\_media</u>. School\_<u>publications\_sponsored media</u> does not provide a forum for public expression. Such publications, as well as the content of student expression in school sponsored activities, shall be subject to the editorial control of the District's administration, whose actions shall be reasonably related to legitimate pedagogical concerns and adhere\_Student Media is subject to the following limitations:

- Advertising may be accepted for <u>publications media</u> that do<u>es</u> not condone or promote products that are inappropriate for the age and maturity of the audience or that endorses such things as tobacco, alcohol, or drugs.
- Publications-Media may be regulated to prohibit writings publications
  communications determined which are, in the opinion of by the appropriate teacher
  and/or\_administratorStudent Media Advisor to be\_rungrammatical; poorly written;
  inadequately researched; biased or prejudiced; vulgar or profane; or unsuitable for
  immature audiences.
- 3. <u>Publications Media</u> may be regulated to refuse to publish prohibit the dissemination of material which might that may reasonably be perceived to advocate drug or alcohol use; irresponsible sex; or conduct otherwise that is otherwise.

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4.—inconsistent with the shared values of a civilized social order<sub>5</sub> or to associate the school with any position other than neutrality on matters of political controversy.

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5.—Prohibited publications includes those that:

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- a. Those that a Are obscene as to minors;
- b. Those that a Are libelous or slanderous, including material containing defamatory falsehoods about public figures or governmental officials, which and are made with knowledge of their falsity or a reckless disregard of the truth;
- c. Those that cC onstitute an unwarranted invasion of privacy as defined by state law:
- d. So incite students as to create a clear and present danger of the Publications that suggest or urge the commission of unlawful acts on the school premises;
- <u>Publications which suggest or urge-So incite students as to create</u> the violation of lawful school regulations; and
- ef. So incite students as to create the material and substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the school;
- <u>g. Hate literature that scurrilously a  $\underline{\underline{A}}$ </u>ttacks ethnic, religious, or racial groups-<u>; or</u>
- £h.Harrass, threaten, or intimidate a student.

## Student Publications Media on School Web Pages

Student publications media that are displayed on school web pages shall follow the same guidelines as listed above and shall also:; plus they shall not contain any non-educational advertisements. Additionally, student web publications shall:

- Adhere to the any restrictions regarding use of Ddirectory Information, as prescribed in Policy 4.13 including not using a student's photograph when associated with the student's name unless written permission has been received from the student's parent or student if over the age of eighteen (18); and
- State that the views expressed are not necessarily those of the School Board or the employees of the District.

Student Media may be distributed at the following times and places:

- 1. Before and after school;
- 2. At recess;
- 3. During school hours, but only passively at designated tables;
- In the hallways during non-instructional time, but only at middle and secondary schools;

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In the cafeterias during non-instructional time and designated lunch periods, but
 only at middle and secondary schools; and

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6. As further authorized by a building principal in a manner that is content and viewpoint neutral and that does not cause a substantial disruption of the orderly education environment.

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## Student Distribution of Non-school Literature, Publications, and Materials

A student or group of students who distribute ten (10) or fewer copies of the same non-school literature, publications, or materials (hereinafter "non-school materials"), shall do so in a time, place, and manner that does not cause a substantial disruption of the orderly education environment. A student or group of students wishing to distribute more than ten (10) copies of non-school materials shall have school authorities review their non-school materials at least three

(3) school days in advance of their desired time of dissemination. School authorities shall review the non-school materials, prior to their distribution and will bar from distribution those non-school materials that are obscene, libelous, pervasively in decentindecent, or advertise unlawful products or services. Material may also be barred from distribution if there is evidence that reasonably supports a forecast that a substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the school or educational environment will likely result from the distribution. Concerns related to any denial of distribution by the principal shall be heard by the Superintendent, whose decision shall be final. The time, place, and manner provisions for distributing non-school materials is governed by the time, place, and manner provisions for distributing Student Media.

The school principal or designee shall determine the time, place, and manner of student distribution of non-school materials.
