Pandemic has highlighted the injustices in this country as a whole.

COVID 19 AND FAMILIES

- Vaccine is likely many months to a year or two away
- Children will be the last to get the vaccine
- Small percentage of the US population has been affected to date
- Need 60-80% of the population to be affected to gain herd immunity

FUTURE OF COVID 19

- We have many things working in our favor that put us in a better place from the start
- HVAC is updated and efficient
- Robust PTO, administration and staff
- Lots of outdoor space and large indoor spaces if needed
- Many highly educated motivated parents in the BRS community and a fantastic teaching staff
- Attendees are in the lowest risk group related to Covid-19 (not no-risk but much lower risk)

BEECHER IS A SPECIAL PLACE

- Children from 0-12 (Beecher aged children) are lowest risk for contracting, becoming symptomatic, and transmitting virus to others.
 Supported by many studies
- 0-12 years old much lower risk of serious illness and hospital care
- Risk is not zero but we can minimize risk in many ways

WHAT DOES THE DATA SHOW?

- At a minimum opening would require low community rates
- Multiple layers of mitigation required
- Space and distance are key factors
- Spacing between students and spacing between adults
- Handwashing/hand sanitizer
- Cohorting—we will need to be creative
- ► Masks
- Changing the structure of the school day
 Rewarding safe behavior

MINIMIZING RISK

- Even if we ultimately have to return to distance learning some children will need to have time in school—special needs, therapies, etc.
- Must ensure equitable learning to the best of our abilities
- > Must recognize where kids are coming from.
- Mental health and education are equally important

FLEXIBILITY

- With the privilege of having an open school comes the responsibility of families to do their part to keep everyone as safe as possible
- Lower threshold for keeping kids and teachers home
- Longer time at home for quarantine and illnesses
- Framing positive outlook to children regardless of internal struggle
- Honesty about exposures and travel

PARENT CONTRACT

- We must demand federal and state government support schools families and covid
- Paid sick leave
- Financial support for schools
- Robust access to rapid return testing and collaboration with department of health and contact tracing efforts.
