## 2025 K-5 Summer School

- Summer School Location Madison Elementary School.
- Summer School starts May 30 and ends June 27. There will be no Summer School on June 19.
- Teachers are expected to arrive by 7:30.
- 111 students enrolled in K-5 Summer School. 32 of these students are required to attend.
- Buses are expected to start rolling in by 7:45. Teachers and Paras are to meet kids at the bus (door 16) and develop lines for their students. Administrators will be assisting. If all students are present, teachers and students can enter the building at 7:55. Breakfast is 8-8:20 with K-1 eating in the Madison cafeteria and grades 2-8 in the RMS cafeteria.
- 8:20-11:30 Instructional time.
- There are no recess breaks.
- 11:30-12:00 Students put away materials and go to lunch. Kindergarten and 1<sup>st</sup> grade (numbers permitting) will eat in the Madison Lunchroom. 2<sup>nd</sup> grade through 5<sup>th</sup> grade will eat in the RMS cafeteria. We will need to designate an area in the RMS cafeteria for these kids to give the Middle School kids some space.
- Paras escort students to the bus pick up area at 12:00 and ensure they all get on the correct bus. Teachers should assist with this for the first week. Paras are done by 12:15. Teachers plan period goes from 12:00 to 12:30.

- 3 Teacher Subs available. If you have an absence planned during summer school, please contact a sub by next week. We only have three subs so please refrain from extended absences. The subs would also need to be notified at least 24 hours in advance. If there are no subs to cover your class, then all students will meet with the other grade level teacher.
- Paras will be assigned if a class has 10-15 students. The goal is to cap classes at 15 students.
- 2 Para subs available.
- We had 2 teachers in total sign up for 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade. We would allow up to 20 in these rooms and we will try to assign 2 paras to each of these rooms if there are 15-20 kids.

- Beth Nelson will be the secretary until June 6. Brandy Farris (TJD's secretary) will take over for the rest of Summer School.
- Summer School student invites are based on where students stand academically. There are 2 criteria to determine students that are required to attend.
  - 1. Students who lack sufficient evidence in Math and ELA on the standards-based report card.
  - 2. Students with STAR scores at or below the 15th percentile. STAR testing will be occurring during the last 2 weeks of April. We should have a good idea of how many students need Summer School by May 9.
- We will be using a component of our EnVision Math curriculum called Summer Impact which is a
  6-week pre-built resource. Summer Impact uses 30 EnVision lessons that are specifically
  designed for targeting each grade level's instructional priorities. Our Summer School session lasts
  4 weeks (20 days). Each lesson is supposed to be 30 minutes. Allowing for some passing time we
  should have approximately 3 hours of instruction time.
- Successmaker the Savvas online intervention will also be available.
- We will be using our Amplify curriculum, the Assessment Remediation Guide (ARG), and Boost (online intervention).
- We will emphasize attendance on day one and periodically throughout the entire Summer School session. Students are permitted 3 absences.
- We would like to see some exceptional student growth during summer school. However, our main goal is
  to give the students a higher degree of academic confidence before they move on to the next grade level.
   Please review your individual student's current STAR data and set some realistic growth goals.
   Small group work and interventions based on what the data tells us will make the greatest impact. There
  will be a STAR assessment at the end of Summer School to determine academic growth. This is the data
  we use to determine the effectiveness of Summer School. This data is shared with the Board of
  Education at the September Board meeting.
