Emergency Operations Planning Committee

K-8 Reading and Writing Curriculum Review

Elementary students are studying how plants grow, the benefits of hydroponics and graphing progress weekly.

The high school students continue to work very hard on their core academics, stepping things up a notch since last semester. The health class and personal finance class are

favorites of the high school students, and every day they note the real-life applications each of these classes convey. The high school students also continue to develop valuable writing and research skills.

Homework continues to be a priority for K-12th students at Hyder School and we are pleased to commend our students for a nearly 100% homework completion rate! We thank the parents for their support with this responsibility building task.
