8th grade football only from 2002-2016

7th Grade football was conducted by the MCYCFL since 1998. Not until the last few years did we provide transportation to the 7th grade away games.

Just prior to implementing 7th grade football, here is what we had at East Minico: **ALL PAID WITH FUNRAISER \$\$**,

- 1 set of 40 Russell home jerseys.
- 1 set of 40 Russell away jerseys.
- 1 set of 40 black practice pants with pads built in.
- 1 set of 40 purple game pants.
- 1 set of 40 girdles and girdle pads for games.
- 40 shoulder pads
- 30 functional purple Adams helmets (expire in 2019 & 2020) 1sm, 11med, 20 lg, 1xl
- 36 purple Xenith Helmets (expire in 2023) 1sm, 14med, 15 lg, 6xl
- <u>The large and XL helmets only fit a few of the 7th graders</u>

What we acquired from MCYCFL:

- 35 pair of smaller shoulder pads
- 50 pair of white practice pants with built in pads.
- No helmets because we thought we had purple helmets that would fit.

What we bought for the 7th graders out of East's budget:

- 50 purple home jerseys \$1250.
- 29 Purple game pants with pads built in. \$793.50
- 12 Schutt purple helmets \$1140.40
- 4 Xenith purple helmets \$639.96
- 3 footballs \$137.97
- Referees for Four home games \$500
- Total \$4461.83

Equipment Rudy bought with fundraising money:

- 50 white visitor jerseys. \$1250
- 28 game pants with pads built in. \$793.50
- Stickers for helmets \$375
- Total \$2418.50

Total Amount Purchased For East

\$6880.33

Transportation was an additional \$850

Financial oversights/unknowns in the Decision

- The anticipated number of 7th graders out for Football
- Most of the previously acquired helmets do not fit most 7th graders.
- The addition of South Hills MS to the conference on the overall athletic budget. \$660 for officials, \$1068 for transportation
- The increased price of A to B transportation.

Most believe that integrating 7th grade football into our schools was the right decision.

- Only three 7th grade schools were left in the MCYCFL and the conference schools were beginning to refuse competition with MCYCFL teams.
- More students get involved when it is sponsored by the school.

Proposal for this 2017 year:

- The district pay for the initial implementation of 7th grade football.
- When we are making budgetary decisions ask, "Where do we get the most bang for the buck?" and distribute accordingly.

For Next Year...IF...

- If 45+ athletes come out for football, We are due to get some new 8th grade football jerseys. The 74 Russell jerseys (home and away) that we have are nine years old. If Russell still makes that model, we will add what we need. If not, we will likely add to number of 7th grade uniforms we purchased this year so that the 7th and 8th grade wear the same uniforms.
- We will offer to buy a cheaper jersey. If the 8th grade wants an upgrade, they can use their fundraiser money to pay the difference.
- One other possibility, cut some of the team next year.
- We will buy 7 new helmets each year to replace the helmets over a 10 year period. The helmets will be interchangeable per team.

Next Year (cont.)

- There were only 14 sixth graders (next year's 7th graders) out for football this year in the MCYCFL.
- Soccer uniforms will be the next mass uniform purchase. We may have the students put their names on the back and have them buy their own, if they would like.
- Other unknowns include gas prices, the number of participants, the amount of gate income, the amount of drivers in the district and in the schools.
