Fall Starts out Hot for 'Stangs

These last two seasons, each of our fall sports teams qualified for OSAA State competition, and this year, from our earlyresults, we may be on our way for the third straight time!

Cross Country

This season the men's and women's team are led by Coach Jeff Kasler, and assisted by Vickie Brown. If you remember, the men are defending State Champions, and the women took third and return a core of that group this year. For the men. Senior Earl Brown holds the top time to date, and the sixth-best time in the 4A Statewide results. On the women's side, Freshmen Sierra Brown holds the 11th-best mark in the 4A level, and junior Alyssa Watson the

20th-best time. They will be at the Chieftain Invitational in Rogue River.

Women's Soccer (3-2, 4-2)

Coach Swanburg's team is currently in a three-way tie with Henley and Cascade Christian for third place in Special District 6. They play at Phoenix Tuesday, followed by home games Thursday and Saturday against Henley and Illinois Valley as they begin the second round of District competition. The Henley game is a reschedule from last week's postponement.

Men's Soccer (2-1, 2-4)

Coach Tim Hannah is back at the helm of the men's soccer program here this year. We currently are in a tie with Henley for second place in the Skyline. The Mustangs play #1-ranked Phoenix at home at 4:00 this Tuesday at the District Office Fields.

Volleyball (19-2-3)

The volleyball team is currently ranked 6th in the 4A Coaches' Poll. Coach Jackson's ladies lost a tough Skyline opener to 4th ranked Henley, and won 3-0 at Phoenix last night. They return against North Valley on Tuesday at 6:30.

Football (1-2, 0-0)

Currently ranked 13th in the 4A AP Poll, Coach Figoni's Mustang football team will open Skyline play at home on 10/09 followed by Illinois Valley at home 10/23, after Friday's final nonconference game at home against Klamath Union.

Trimester Eligibility

The new requirements to be athletically eligible are found in the Student Handbook. In brief, a student must be registered for and passing 4 classes to be considered eligible by the OSAA. Further, students must have a 2.0 GPA based upon the previous trimester's grades. Progress reports will be mailed out on Oct. 5th, and I encourage you to evaluate your student's progress, and call for a conference on 10/08.



Greetings from the Transition Center!

The students in the transition center are happily recycling this year. Last year we recycled 50, 032 lbs of paper. That is the equivalent of 425 trees used for paper pulp. Once again we take cell phones, ink jet cartridges, newspaper, magazines, books, printer paper, digital items such as cameras and lap tops, plastic water bottles, and pop cans. We recycle the cans from the kitchen.

The transition center serves 18 students with varied levels of disabilities, all considered to severely impact their lives. The students need opportunities to work and to learn to care for themselves. We have a very active cooking program. We are working on our greenhouse and gardening projects. Students also pick up the lost and found at the end of every trimester, wash and sort it, sending some to the family advocacy program and some to the Goodwill. We also cut up the clothing that is too worn to be used again into rags. The students enjoy making their contributions to the community of Hidden Valley.

We will take donation of gardening equipment, materials, and compost; items on our recycling list, and craft materials.

I also wish to thank my wonderful staff: Donna Cooper, Cathy Byard, Janis Posin, Laura Hunter, Laura Cramp, Jeannie Heisler Sherrie Lamb, and Julie Moran for their hard work. These women deal with medical and health issues, adults in diapers, running language and social skills programs, running vocational programs and just running. They deserve much appreciation. Without them, the students would not grow to be more competent young adults.

PSAT for Sophomores

PSAT will be administered at HVHS Wednesday October 14th. All sophomores will be given the opportunity to take the PSAT at no cost. Juniors may sign up for the PSAT in Counseling. The cost for juniors will be 20 dollars paid before the test is administered. National Merit Scholarships are tied to the Junior PSAT results. Pretest and PSAT information flyers are available from Counseling. Please see counseling for more information.

Juniors – if you are interested in taking the PSAT on October 14th, please bring \$20 to the book keeper and your receipt to counseling in order to sign up. This test takes place just one time every school and it is a great tool for predicting SAT scores for college bound students. Juniors not taking the PSAT on October 14th will have the opportunity to take the ASVAB, a great tool when it comes to career exploration.

10th graders – On October 14th all 10th graders will be taking the PSAT, free of charge. Counseling will be distributing test preparation booklets.




Pre-College Youth Program Fall 2009 Classes For High School Students



Opportunities for High School Students to Earn Southern Oregon University College Credit-It's a Win Win!

SOU offers programs for high school students that allow university credit while still in high school. These programs benefit regional juniors and seniors in high school by maximizing their final years in high school AND by helping them earn university credits at a reduced tuition level!

Having trouble getting all the courses you need right now? The Early Entry program is for high school juniors and seniors who meet the qualifications to take 100 and 200 level courses on the SOU Ashland or Medford campus for college credit. See your high school counselor about your participation in the program or call 552-6452. Early Entry tuition is only \$60 per credit.

Are you taking AP classes that are aligned with SOU? The Advanced Southern Credit Program (ASC) consists of university courses taught in your high school by SOU approved high school faculty, usually as part of the Advanced Placement or Honors curriculum. Students register for credit with their high school teacher at the low cost of \$30 per credit.

In both programs, the students receive standard university credits that are transcripted by the SOU Enrollment Center. Some students earn enough credits through these programs to cover up to a year of their college education--quite a head start towards college graduation!
