Facts of this matter

ZCS Elementary fourth grade teachers & building administrators seek approval for an overnight trip to Camp Tecumseh in September and October for the camp's Pioneer Heritage program. Camp Tecumseh staff and facilities will be the provider of the room, meals, and programming for all students, parents, and teachers attending.

The cost for the two-day educational opportunity will be approximately **\$67.00 per student/parent** attending this trip for the overnight experience. Overnight pricing includes:

- A cabin for overnight accommodations
- 3 meals (dinner, breakfast, and lunch)
- Two camp counselors to lead our group
- All program supplies and materials needed

Note: For students not attending Camp Tecumseh, learning experiences will be provided for students by their classroom teacher and will be implemented/facilitated by other building level staff at the school building. Communication of learning opportunities and experiences will be provided to students, families and collaborating staff.

Objective POSITIVES related to this item or approach

This opportunity meets many of our Indiana State Standards. Partial listing of addressed standards are located below.
