Cardiac Emergency Response Plan

The Cardiac Emergency Response Plan (CERP) provides direction on how to respond to a Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA). This plan outlines recognizing the signs of a SCA, activating the Cardiac Emergency Response Team (CERT), calling 9-1-1, retrieving an AED, and starting hands only CPR. <u>Immediate</u> response and action is critical for the best chance of survival.

Follow these steps: ACT Assess-Call-Treat

A: Assess the surroundings for safety and assess person for responsiveness

- 1. Check around you and make sure you will be safe responding to help
- 2. When reaching a person in need: Shout are you okay?
- 3. Recognize the signs of Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA)
 - a. Sudden collapse: not moving, unresponsive or unconscious.
 - b. No signs of breathing or having irregular/gasping breaths.
 - c. May appear to be shaking like having a seizure.

B: Call 9-1-1 and delegate someone to get the AED

- Call 9-1-1 if you suspect a sudden cardiac arrest to get access to emergency medical help. Provide patient information, school address (and specific location). Remain on the line with 9-1-1 until EMS arrives.
- 2. If during school hours: Call the main office and have them activate the members of your Cardiac Emergency Response Team (CERT) by your school's designated communication system (overhead page).
 - a. Give the exact location of the emergency.
 - b. If you are a CERT member, go immediately to the location of the emergency.
 - c. The closest team member to the AED should retrieve it and take it to the emergency scene.
 - d. CERT team members each have a job. First priority is the patient in need with CPR and the AED.
 - Remove other students from the scene
 - Wait for ambulance and escort them to exact location
 - Keep record of time: event called, shocks given...
 - Keep students in the classroom until all is clear announced.
 - Rotate chest compressors every 2 minutes

- 3. After school hours/after school events: Follow steps 1 and 2 from above. Contact administrator on duty.
 - Recognize SCA
 - Call 9-1-1 and get the AED
 - Start CPR with chest compressions

C: Treat the patient - Start CPR with chest compressions. Apply the AED as soon as it arrives.

- 1. Use 2 hands (the heel of one hand and the other hand on top) and push hard and fast in the center of the chest. Pushing to a depth at least 2 inches (meet resistance) and compressions of 100-120 beats per minute.
 - When doing compressions, you may hear or feel a rib break. While
 it is scary, do <u>NOT</u> stop doing CPR. Broken ribs will heal. A broken
 heart will not without continued help.
- 2. When the AED arrives... do <u>NOT</u> stop compressions! The person that brings the AED is in charge of turning it on and applying the pads around you. The pads must be applied to a bare chest.
 - Minimize interruptions of compressions when applying pads to a person's bare chest.
 - Make sure person is lying flat on their back on a hard surface
- When the AED arrives, turn on the machine and follow the AED's verbal
 instructions. Apply the pads to a bare chest. If the person needs to be
 shocked back into a normal heart rhythm, the AED will deliver one or more
 shocks.
 - Note: Putting the pads on will not shock you
 - The AED will only deliver shocks if needed.
- 4. If you are comfortable with giving breaths, use a barrier device and give 2 breaths after 30 compressions. If you are not comfortable, hands only chest compression is okay.
- 5. Continue CPR until the person is responsive or EMS arrives and takes over.
- 6. Once EMS arrives they take over care.
 - Summarize details of the event
 - What happened surrounding the event
 - How long CPR has been done
 - How many (if any) shocks were delivered

- D: Actions to be taken by the office/administrative team.
 - Confirm the exact location of the person in need
 - Activate the CERT team and give the exact location
 - Confirm that 9-1-1 was called. If not, call 9-1-1 immediately
 - Notify other staff: School nurse, athletic trainer, SRO, etc..
 - Designate people to cover the duties of the CPR responders
 - Copy patient's information for EMS staff
 - Notify patient's emergency contact (parent/guardian, spouse, etc.)
 - Assign someone to direct "crowd control"
 - Keep students in classrooms and out of the hallways until an announcement is made to resume normal activities

E: Debrief

- 1. Discuss the outcome of the cardiac emergency with all parties involved.
 - What went well?
 - What did not go well?
 - What can be done to improve a future response?
 - Do crisis counselors need to be called?





Baseball field	In the concession stand


Building Map
