We came in 11^{th} at state with three of the four boys we sent to state placing in the top three slots for their divisions. Matt Coultas got a championship title, Gabe Miller came in 2^{nd} , and Zack Anderson came in 3^{rd} .

The addition of Loren King to our coaching staff as the girls' basketball coach has been such a blessing. Though our girls did not win many games, they are a young team and showed steady improvement throughout the season. Coach King is a solid coach and committed to building a strong girls' program out here.

The boys' basketball team "The Brotherhood" is headed to state this week. They were 8 and 0 for the season and took the conference title. They won round one on our home court on the 25th of February and will play Dayton in the semi-finals at North Bend High School on March 3rd. As the season progressed, our gym filled for each home game. The community, alumni, and student support was awesome to see ... and hear! Over 80% of our seniors have now successfully completed their senior projects. We have one more presentation time scheduled for May. Students who have not attempted a presentation and students who did not pass the first time they tried will have the opportunity to complete during the final round.

SUCCESSFUL WELDERS

On February the 3rd, our welding students went to RCC for a Weldathon. We did well with 14 of our students bringing home awards – by far the largest percentage of any of the schools that were there. Students competed in Arc, Tig, Mig, Oxy, and torch welding. A few days later, I received an email from Todd Giesbrecht, the welding department head at RCC. In it he said: *I would like to express how impressed I was with the team that represented IV at our Weldathon. Amy Meyer and her crew truly were the standout team for the contest. They not only dominated the contest by taking well over 50 percent of the medals available, the team as a whole was very well behaved and professional in their appearance and demeanor.
