### PBIS at TMS

The school PBIS program is the system we use to teach and reinforce expected behaviors in all areas of the building. Supporting appropriate student behaviors creates a positive school environment. We use our Hatchet Cash reward system to acknowledge these good behaviors. Students can receive Hatchet Cash from any staff member for a number of reasons. Some of those reasons are demonstrating good citizenship, making positive choices, demonstrating leadership, helping others, "doing the right thing," or showing improvement in academics. Students receive Hatchet Cash randomly, not for every instance they make a good choice. Ultimately we want students to make positive choices not solely for the reward, but because it is simply the right thing to do. Using their Hatchet Cash students can earn group rewards together. This helps motivate them to try their best and to encourage others as well.

Throughout the school year students will participate in activities in Team time which promote demonstrating the expected behaviors in various areas of the school. There are also posters in the classrooms, hallways, and cafeteria stating the expected behaviors, as well as our school-wide agreement. To learn more about PBIS, visit our school website. Mr. Lenz is the author of the anti-bullying book, <u>Dignity Revolution</u>, and he has initiated a national pledge to stand up for the worth, value, and dignity of every person. Since he began speaking in schools in 1982, he has spoken to more than five million people in all 50 states and across the world.

Mr. Lenz will speak to our 5th-8th grade students during the school day in two assemblies. In the evening, Mr. Lenz will speak to families and community members at 6:00 pm in the auditorium. This evening program will be sponsored by many of our local churches and community organizations. The evening program is meant to be a proactive event and a valuable resource for parents in helping their children deal with the pressures of substance abuse, self-harm, suicide, and bullying.

Red Ribbon Week will not solve all of our problems, and it is not meant to be our focus for only one week of the year. At TMS it is a continual effort to
