COVID-19 Report and Discussion

Cases at Belmond-Klemme

At this early point in the school year, we have three positive cases, that we know of, to report:

- 1. Two members of the Bronco football team tested positive for COVID-19 with the results known on Saturday, August 22, 2020. Due to the close proximity of their contact, the entire football team was guarantined for 14 days and returned to action on Tuesday, September 1.
- 2. On Wednesday, August 26, 2020, we had our first case within our classrooms. A single student tested positive for COVID-19 on the second day of classes on Tuesday, August 25. Due to our careful and compartmentalized instructional delivery system in our high school, exposure was extremely limited and contained, and no other students were considered exposed and removed from our classrooms.
- 3. On Thursday, September 10, we became aware of our third incident. A student who was present in our secondary school on Tuesday, September 8, tested positive. Upon learning of the positive test, our school immediately implemented diligent contact tracing to find who may have been exposed. Exposure was limited to eight students and two siblings. The exposed students are currently at home, under observation, and continuing their studies online.

We feel like our careful and measured approach to instruction is succeeding despite the continued and broadening spread of the COVID-19 virus.

Transition at High School

As of Thursday afternoon, September 3, our two-week positivity rate in Wright County had fallen to 4.0 percent. We made the decision that starting Tuesday morning after Labor Day, the high school would transition from all online instruction with students in homerooms all day to attending regular classes.


However, the high school remains on the block schedule with four ninety-minute periods on alternating days. So, students will only have three classroom transitions per day, rather than seven.

Current Positivity Rate




COVID-19 in IOWA

We missed the opportunity to play the junior high football game we had scheduled with Central Springs. The parents of the Central Springs football players were unwilling to send their team to play with Belmond-Klemme due to the fear of contracting the COVID-19 virus here.
