Parent/Teacher Relationships

How To Establish a Working Relationship With Your Child's Teacher:

Meet with the teacher in the fall. Tell the teacher about your child's special needs, outside activities, health and home study habits.

Look for the positive. Share with the teacher something you appreciate regarding the teacher's role in your child's life. Express your appreciation by sending a note of thanks when something special takes place in the classroom.

Let the teacher know you want to support work that's being done in class. Ask for suggestions for expanding school activities into home activities.

Be willing to participate in or set up a conference when necessary, such as when: your child's grades plunge; he does not seem to have homework; she seems deeply upset about something that happened at school.

How to reach your teacher:

There are several ways to contact your child's teacher. When you need to ask questions or share information, you can call and leave a message so the teacher can call you back, you can write a note, or you can stop by and leave a message. Teachers are generally most available for meeting with or talking to you from 2:00-3:00 most days, except Wednesdays. We ask that parents avoid dropping into the classrooms first thing in the morning as teachers are preparing for their teaching at that time. However, you are welcome to drop by the office in the morning and we can leave a message for the teacher to contact you as soon as possible! We want to help!

Amportant Information.



Parents need to supply a pair of non marking sole shoes for P.E. If a child's daily shoes have white or light colored soles they are fine. Shoes with black or dark colored soles leave a heavy mark on our gym floor. This wears on the finish and thus wears the tile out quickly. We ask that you check your child's shoes for this purpose. Mark any P.E. shoes with your child's name and send in to school. We will store for use throughout the year. These shoes do not need to be new.

Special Occasion Foods



We <u>cannot</u> serve any foods that are not prepared in a professional and certified kitchen. This means unless it comes from a licensed kitchen we cannot serve a food item. Food items should come in the original, unopened packaging. Students can bring homemade items for their own lunches, but cannot share those items with others. We cannot allow homemade items to be served at any school function during the school day. Thanks for following this standard at all times. Please remember this if you are supplying treats for any type of classroom celebration.

Student Support Services Available

This year we are fortunate to have an excellent student advocate, Kelly DeLisle. She will provide many opportunities to serve all of our students and encourage the development of healthy mental health practices. In this role, she will sometimes visit classrooms to teach lessons, visit the playground to interact and get to know students better, and she will at times bring together specific individuals or groups to work on special needs. In the case of individuals or groups that will meet more than once, parent permission will be required. Our student advocate will also help us deal with crisis situations as needed. We are fortunate to have her great support this year! If you have any questions you can call her on Tuesdays all day or Thursdays in the afternoon. Please ask for her when you call us at 541-476-6624.

Ost and Found



Please mark all of your child's sweaters, sweatshirts, coats, jackets, backpacks, lunch pails, etc. with a name. If a name is found on an item, we can promptly return it to the owner, so please, please make sure you mark those clothes. Also, remember to check periodically in our lost and found if you think your child has left something here. It is located on the wall to the right as you enter the cafeteria. The Lost and Found will also be out at conference time.





Our PTO will once again fund free popcorn for students wearing Madrona colors on Pride days. Pride Days are usually the last Friday of each month. Check our school calendar on line for specific dates. Students must be wearing an item of clothing that is mostly one of our school colors to qualify for free popcorn. Popcorn will also be available for sale on Pride days for 25 cents per bag. Our school colors are black and yellow. Madrona T-shirts are a good way for kids to display their school pride. T-shirts and sweatshirts are available for sale in the school office.

Life Skills, Second Steps, and Steps To Respect

Second Step is a specific curriculum we teach in our classrooms aimed at helping students to avoid violent behaviors and choosing appropriate social responses to various situations. Using Second Step along with our PBIS program, we hope to help our students gain social skills that will help them get along well with others throughout life and to make good personal choices.

We use an anti-bullying program called Steps to Respect in fourth and fifth grades. Steps to Respect focuses on students understanding what bullying behaviors look like including acts of exclusion and isolation and how to appropriately respond to those behaviors. It is the intent of the program to reduce the number of bullying acts that happen at school.

Each month teachers will be selecting up to 2 students for Citizen of the Month. This award is for demonstrating good behavior choices at school. These students model being safe, respectful, and responsible. Those students will be honored at our monthly Pride Assembly. Students who achieve a citizenship award will also be able to choose a book of their own from a large collection. This is our way of saying thanks for making good choices while at school.

Attendance Reporting

As you know, students who have excellent attendance are more likely to have solid achievement at school. We can't teach them if they aren't here! It is required by the No Child Left Behind Act for the school to average 92% attendance or higher each year. For students to reach that goal, they must miss no more than 14 days of school over the entire year. That means missing on average no more than 1 day per month. Parents are the most important decision

makers about attendance. You have the choice to schedule appointments, shopping, dance lessons and vacations at times that will not impact your child's attendance. Be aware and make good choices for your child.

There is a change in the way that we record students who leave early as well as those who arrive late. In the past, there was no notation if a student left before school was out. This year, we will be recording it as a "PM Tardy", and it will be counted toward the perfect attendance goals. There is no difference between a student missing school at the beginning of the day or the end of the day. Either way, it still impacts their learning. We know that sometimes it is unavoidable to schedule appointments during school time, and those are notated as "Office Tardy" which means that they are "excused", but they still count as a Tardy.

A parent must excuse student absences. It is required that you let us know when and why your child is absent. You can help us with this in two ways. You can call us the day of the absence and tell us why your child is out, or you can write a note and send that in on the day your child returns to school. Absences are only excused for illness, Dr. appointments, death in the immediate family and family emergencies. All other absences are unexcused. We call every day if we have not heard from you, or if the absence reason is unexcused. Make sure you have called or sent a note within 48 hours, or your child's absence becomes unexcused regardless of the reason. For a student to earn monthly or yearly perfect attendance awards and privileges, they must have 0 tardies or absences.



A Word From Our Family Advocate

We have a Family Advocate program at our school which is designed to provide services to families such as assistance with clothing, shoes, and other hygiene items. Everything is completely confidential, and handled with sensitivity. Our advocate, Andrea Rodgers, also calls families to alert them about meetings and to help with attendance issues.

We keep a good supply of clean, extra clothing here at the school in case a student spills something on their clothes and needs to change. If you have any clothing items to donate, please bring them to the office. Thanks for helping keep our Madrona Hornets comfortable!

Please always make sure you have parked safely in the lot before leaving your car. Your cooperation is appreciated.

Education of All Disabled Children/Young Adults

Public law 105.17 known as I.D.E.A. (Individualized Disability Education Act) requires that school districts provide a free and appropriate education to all disabled children/young adults ages 0 to 21. Three Rivers School District requests the identification of any disabled children/young adults between the ages of 0 to 21, who are not enrolled or currently being served by the district schools.

No Child Left Behind

Our school receives federal funds for Title One programs that are part of the No Child Left Behind Act. Under this law, you have the right to request information regarding the professional qualifications of your child's classroom teacher(s). If you request this information, the district will provide you with this information in a timely manner. You have the right to request the following information:

- If the teacher has met state licensing requirements for the grade level and subjects in which the teacher is providing instruction
- If the teacher is teaching under an emergency status for which state licensing requirements have been waived
- The type of college degree major of the teacher and the field of discipline for any graduate degrees and certificates
- If your child is receiving Title
 One services from
 paraprofessionals and if so,
 his/her qualifications

I would like to encourage you to help your child participate even if it is with just a small donation. Our PTO uses every penny wisely to support activities like field trip transportation, assemblies, items for our classrooms, and big ticket items like new computers, classroom tables, library and computer lab needs. Our PTO's fund raising efforts are a crucial part of how our school provides new and better learning opportunities for our children.

Thanks to all the parents who came to Open House. It is a wonderful time to get to know each other better, celebrate a great start to the year and get an update on the changes and programs impacting our student's new school year. As we discussed at the Title One portion of our Open House meeting, our school qualifies for Federal Title One dollars based on our free and reduced lunch applications. Approximately 70% of our students qualify for support with meals. We use our funds to support the goals of our school-wide plan which in general are to improve student engagement, improve communication and collaboration at all levels within our school and district, to support student progress and growth in academics and specifically in writing and math, and to encourage behaviors at school that help students use learning time well and to be successful socially in the world. Our site council is the parent/staff group that meets each month make decisions that impact our implementation of the school-wide plan. No plan would be successful without parents. Madrona is a great school and our parents help make it that way. Your involvement in your child's education is the key to his/her growth. You are cordially invited to all parent meetings both site council and PTO. Please check our monthly calendar in the newsletter for the dates and times of those meetings. Our site council also recently reviewed and approved the school compact you will see in this newsletter. Please read and review with your child.

Title One funds help to supplement instruction in reading, writing and math. Our school program this year includes a half time Title One Teacher, Mrs. Patty Enoch. Patty is a highly skilled teacher who brings much experience to the position. She will be serving students throughout our school in a variety of ways. Some students will work directly with her in small groups during or after school. Students will be offered the opportunity based on need as determined by the teacher. Mrs. Enoch will also be involved in providing extra support and training to our staff. Along with that we have added some additional assistant hours to improve service to students and to further support our communication with parents. We have continued implementing the Positive Behavior Intervention and Support program (PBIS) to help kids make safe, respectful and responsible choices at school. A portion of our funds will also support staff development activities to strengthen instruction. If you are interested, we

will have printed copies of our plan available for interested parents and community members in late October. As always, we are here to help and if you have questions, please contact either myself or Mrs. Enoch at the school.

Notes required!

Please be aware that the bus drivers require a bus pass issued by the Madrona office anytime your child is going to ride the bus anywhere other than his/her normal stop. The only way that a bus pass can be issued is by **BOTH** children having a note from their parents. At no time is a child allowed to get off at an undesignated stop, or to ride a different bus without a pass issued by the office. Thank you for making those plans ahead of time and ensuring that your child has a note.

Rutomated Phone Calls

We have a new system that will periodically make telephone calls to all our parents. This new system is called "Synrevoice". What a wonderful tool this is, and we hope that it will help us to communicate with you. We use this system to notify parents of upcoming events, attendance, days that are impacted by inclement weather, emergencies, or other reasons which may require us to reach everyone in a timely manner. When you receive a call from Synrevoice, you must say "hello" to activate the message being sent to you. If you don't say

anything when we call, you will not get a message. It is also connected to our student information system, therefore it is very important that the information you provide to us on your students' enrollment form is accurate and kept up to date. If you have a phone number change or disconnection and we try to send you a message, you will obviously not receive it. So, please help us keep you informed by notifying the school office when personal information changes.

Fearsome 15 Fact Program

We have started a new way for students to practice and remember math facts. These facts are identified by research as being the most difficult for students to learn. Healthy Kids

Depending on family income, children may be eligible for free or low-cost health coverage for doctor visits, dental care, vision, medicines and more through the Healthy Kids program.

Three things determine if your child qualifies for nocost or low-cost coverage:

- 1. **Age** under 19 years old
- Residency Must live in Oregon and be a legal resident
- 3. <u>Income</u> \$44,100 or less for a family of 4 qualifies for no-cost coverage: \$66,000 or less for a family of 4 qualifies for coverage on a sliding scale cost.
