Teaching, Learning & Relevance

- On April 30, the Science and Social Studies Content Teams met to continue their curriculum and assessment work. The Science team is progressing in its efforts to align grading and reporting at the assessment level, ensuring consistency and clarity across grade levels. Meanwhile, the Social Studies team is actively cross-referencing state standards with the existing CKLA curriculum to identify which standards are currently addressed and which require additional focus. On May 1, the ELA and Math Content Teams convened. The Math team made significant progress in reviewing common assessments that will inform grade determination, while the ELA team began their work by outlining a clear list of action steps to guide their next phases of development.
- The Building Leadership Team met on April 23 to continue its work on grading and reporting practices. The group engaged in thoughtful discussion and reached a consensus to transition the next phase of ELA grading and reporting development to the ELA Content Team, allowing for more refined, grade-specific work. The team also identified its next goal: to design a streamlined Progress Reporting structure for use at the end of grading periods 1 and 3. Several team members are currently drafting a layout, which will be shared ahead of our final meeting of the year to finalize the structure.
