ATTENTION PARENTS

In the event of adverse weather conditions, parents are advised to tune in to Radio Stations KRWQ, KAJO, KLDR, KBOY and TV Stations KOBI (5), KDRV (12), KTVL (10), or Three Rivers School District Web Page for information on school bus schedules and school closures.

Sometimes weather conditions leave some roads blocked or unsafe to travel but school is still being held. Under these circumstances "straight line routes" will be run. This is the information you will get on the web page or radio/TV stations.

When straight line routes are run <u>the roads affected</u> <u>are listed below.</u> If you live on one of the roads the buses cannot travel, you may bring your student to the nearest intersection of the main road traveled. This will also be the stop for the afternoon drop off.

H1N1 FLU AND ATTENDANCE

The Three Rivers School District is working closely with the Josephine County Health Department to monitor flu conditions in our county and to make decisions about the best steps to take. We need your help in reminding your child to do the following things so that we can stop the spread of germs:

- Wash your hands often using soap and water.
- Cover your mouth and nose with tissue when coughing and sneezing.
- Throw used tissues into the trash and then wash your hands.
- Cough into your sleeve.
- Stay home if you are sick and stay away from others as much as possible.
- Keep children home if they are sick or have the symptoms listed below.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention defines an influenza-like illness as having the following symptoms:

Fever of 100^o degrees Fahrenheit or higher AND

ONE or MORE OF THE FOLLOWING: Cough Sore throat Headache Muscle ache

If your child shows flu-like symptoms while at school, he or she will be sent to the school office for screening (symptom check and/or taking temperature). If the student meets the definition as described above, he/she must be excluded from school until symptom free. This means that your child will not be allowed back in school until 24 hours after the fever is gone (without the use of fever reducing medications).



Parents: remember to **call Mindi in the school office at 846-7224** when your child is ill or absent for any reason. Office hours are from 6:45am—3:15pm. If for any reason your child will be absent for an extended period of time it is very important to notify the office and your child's teacher prior to the absence. Keeping up with homework and school activities will help your child ease the stress of returning after an extended absence.

<u>I APPRECIATE ALL THE EFFORTS</u> you have made to get your student to school on time. The first few minutes of school are important to your student as teachers are going over attendance, daily schedules, and agendas.

The class has been working on what makes a sentence: subject, action, capitalization, and ending punctuation marks. Each student is encouraged on a daily basis to keep expanding ideas and adding details to what is already written.

We use our Promethean Board daily, sometimes for writing, and always for our morning calendar activities. Two teachers from Applegate School came in to see how the class manipulates words, numbers, and figures on the board. The teachers also saw how the promethean clickers work and were impressed with the students' enthusiasm and knowledge based upon their quick responses to inputting answers.

Students are working on number sense, addition, and subtraction skills in math. PE is fun using the parachute and playing "Protect the Post" after doing warm up exercises. In art, students are learning the elements of art, doing water color-crayon resists, and making art out of leaves.

At the end of the month, students were excited to celebrate the holiday by focusing on Maurice Sendak's "Where the Wild Things Are". Costumes were made, stories were written, math was completed, and there was even a Wild Rumpus! Everyone is looking forward to the first fieldtrip



of the year on November 12th to the Jacksonville Children's Museum.

Mr. Morgan's class has had a busy and interesting October. The trip to White Oaks Farm went great. We followed it up with a ten question science quiz about just the things taught to us by the White Oaks farmers. Almost everyone scored very well.

Our writing is coming along nicely. We're reading our work to each other and trying to find where to punctuate and capitalize.

In the math book we are nearing the end of chapter 3. We will take a test on mental math, finding missing addends, regrouping, estimating, and solving story problems.
