December 8 Choir and S.W.A.T. Performance Choir and S.W.A.T. students will be presenting a Christmas concert for friends and family to enjoy.






December 9

In the Classrooms:



Kindergarten

November and December are such exciting months for us in Kindergarten! In social studies, we studied the lives of the Pilgrims and Native Americans in order to understand the tradition of Thanksgiving. As the winter holidays approach, we will begin learning about different celebrations around the world such as Hanukkah, Kwanzaa and Christmas. We are also beginning to investigate the Christmas traditions of Mexico as we prepare for *Celebrations Around the World*.

In language arts, we used our writing skills to write letters to our adopted soldiers in Afghanistan, as well as journal writing. We are beginning to make words using the letter sounds we know. Guided reading has begun and there is great excitement when a new book is introduced.

In math, we are practicing counting to 100, writing and recognizing numbers 1-20, making patterns and sorting shapes. The concepts of addition and subtraction will be introduced before we leave for Christmas. In science, we are learning about water and soil and why they are important.

As you can tell we are keeping very busy in Kindergarten!



In math, students are learning about U.S. coins, and recognizing and comparing numbers to 80. In language arts, students are learning the long vowel sounds with silent e and how to look at parts of words to read. In writing, students are learning to write simple poems and fantasy stories to a prompt. In science, students are learning about different types of soil and sources of water. In social studies, we will be "traveling" to England for *Celebrations Around the World* and learning about other holiday customs.

2nd Grade

1st Grade



Second Grade is very busy during November and December. In math, we are working on counting money and reviewing time. In social studies, we will be studying Japan for *Celebrations Around the World*. In writing, we are writing narratives using three well written paragraphs. We will be enjoying learning about Native Americans and the first Thanksgiving by celebrating a feast. We will also enjoy a Christmas breakfast before our Christmas vacation and a book exchange as a class. In science, we are finishing up our unit on heat and energy.

3rd Grade



Wow, it is already the third six weeks! Third graders are moving along nicely and blooming with new knowledge! In math this third six weeks, we are focusing on place value, whole numbers, estimating, rounding, and adding compatible numbers. In ELAR (English, language arts, and reading), students are learning the difference between fiction and non-fiction text by focusing on expository text. They are also learning how to write a good body paragraph and recognizing figurative language in text. We are also reviewing consonants and vowels and the role they play in a word. We started social studies this year by learning about communities and now third graders are learning about important people in our history and the role that they played in making our country what it is today. For *Celebrations Around the World*, they are studying Switzerland. Many of the classes have already had class time in the outdoor classroom! In science we will be learning the rock cycle and physical landforms.

We are excited about the upcoming year and look forward to being with the students each day, teaching them and influencing their lives ©



Fourth graders that know their multiplication facts are so cool! They were rewarded with a special treat if they showed mastery of their facts.

Germany will be represented by fourth grade at *Celebrations Around the World* celebration. We hope to see all of you there. It is magical! Research will be done by students for this event. We will also continue learning how Texas became a state. "Remember the Alamo!" a famous cry heard throughout Texas. Famous people of the Alamo are being researched in class so that we can create books about them to share with others.

In science, we will be learning about how the earth changes through erosion, weathering, rocks and minerals.



4th Grade



The 5th graders have completed one CSCOPE test. Some of them did well. However, we have started tutoring groups for the ones that need extra help. This was a learning experience for all of us.

In social studies, the 5th grade students are learning how people in Spain celebrate the upcoming holiday season. In reading, they are working on compare and contrast, genre, theme, cause & effect of historical events, and

point of view. We are beginning to read <u>Esperanza Rising</u>, and tying it into a family traditions paper that will be written in language arts.

In science, we are studying fossils and the clues they give us to earth's mysterious past. Then we are expanding our scope to our celestial neighborhood and compare the characteristics of the moon, the sun, and our home planet.

In fifth grade math, we are working with factors and fractions. The students are identifying factors of a whole number and common factors of a set of numbers. After Thanksgiving break, we will begin studying fractions. We will be comparing, finding equivalent fractions, adding and subtracting fractions. The students are working very hard and are doing a great job. We continue to see students becoming more confident and successful in their math skills.

In writing, the fifth graders are currently working on persuasive writing. They have prepared an opinion essay concerning the current school dress code. Hopefully, there will be a few really good ones that will be shared with the school board members during the December meeting. The students have worked hard on these papers. Please take a few minutes read them with an open mind, and take them for what they are (opinion of a 10 year old). I have been trying to instill in the students that even children's opinions matter, though they are rarely asked to express their opinions. If they do not get involved they will never make a difference. If you have time, could you send us a letter back to acknowledge the efforts of the students; they would feel like they did their part and their opinions were heard.
