



VACTE INDUSTRY CERTIFCATIONS VACTE STUDENTS ARE PREPARED FOR THE WORKFORCE

CERTIFIED NURSE'S ASSISTANT PROGRAM:

*OSHA 10 Healthcare- This certification is a 10-hour course that helps the students with safety in a healthcare setting. It gives them information and certifications in regard to items like; Blood Borne Pathogens, **Personal Protective Equipment** and Emergency Services. It also teaches them about communication skills, personal finance and interviewing skills. *CPR- Our students get BLS for Health Care Provider CPR, which gives them practice in healthcare settings and outside of healthcare settings. This is a 2-year certification in which students can perform CPR. Most healthcare jobs have this as a requirement for employment. So, we give this to them to give them a head start in the employment process.

***CNA Certificate of** Completion-This is given to the students that have successfully completed at least 120 hours of classroom, skills and clinical time. They are required to pass the final written exams with a 75% or better and an 80% or better on the skills final. The students that get this certificate are then able to sit for the AZBN state board test. *CNA State Certification-This Certification is given once a student has completed the **AZBN State certification Examination. They can apply for** a CNA/LNA license through the Arizona State Board of Nursing. This license entitles them to work as a Certified Nursing **Assistant in the State of** Arizona, anywhere that



This course will introduce and train students in the basic to advanced skills necessary to pursue a career in Law Enforcement and Emergency Telecommunications. This course covers instruction and hands on practice in law enforcement history and theory, operational command leadership, administration of public police organizations, labor relations, incident response strategies, legal and regulatory responsibilities, prison guard skills and dispatch skills in police and emergency management services. Practice on real-life situations related to dispatch and law related situations are incorporated.

VACTE Students receive approximately 18 credit hours towards a Criminal Justice major. Upon completion of this course, students will have the opportunity to test for certification in APCO-Public Safety

Telecommunication Dispatcher and Arizona Dept. of Public Safety-Security Guard Certification. Second year students will have extensive training in 911 Dispatch and will be employable for entry level Law Enforcement jobs.
